

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### **¾** Introduction

Theodore Timothy "Ted" Judge died in Cupertino, California, June 11, 2008. Although neither he nor his late wife Ellen Sheehy Judge left descendants, they shared a mutual interest in family history which they had enthusiastically pursued over the years. In his will, Ted left legacies to numerous charities and institutions, including the Bancroft Library at the University of California at Berkeley, where he had spent many hours as a student. Among his bequests was the requirement that the Bancroft Library, in conjunction with the administrators of his estate, arrange for the publication of a book of Judge and Sheehy genealogy to be distributed to Ted and Ellen's cousins.

Pat Fell, a part-time librarian at the Bancroft Library, who also worked in cataloging at the California Genealogical Society, suggested in May 2009 that the society might handle the project. A meeting to discuss the possibilities was arranged with Patrick Sheehy, executor and a trustee of the estate; a representative of the University; society president Jane Knowles Lindsey; and member Judy Bodycote. After several months of negotiation, an agreement was signed in September 2009. Society members Judy Bodycote, Lavinia Schwarz, and Patricia Smith began the research for the project, assisted by Richard Rees and Laura Spurrier.

Ted's will stated that he wished to provide a genealogy of both his and Ellen's families back to their immigrant ancestors. In the early stages a decision was made to include the ancestors of Ted Judge's stepfather, Albert Sylvan Taylor, who raised Ted and for whom he cared deeply. As research progressed, many lines were discovered that extended back into 17th and 18th century Pennsylvania and New England. After several meetings with Trustee Patrick Sheehy, it was agreed that research would stop at five generations back and would then include descendants from that point.

As a result of the decision to limit coverage to five generations, research already completed on earlier families and their descendants was omitted from the final publication. Some of this research is extensive and covers in particular the families of Moore, Farneman, Kuns, Vannoy, McMurphy, Boland, Dikeman, Coleman and Hail. Omitted research has been archived at the society and is available to interested historians and genealogists.

With less than six months to complete the project Judy Zelver, Lorna Wallace and Barbara Dyer joined the team to provide additional research assistance. Nancy Peterson assumed final writing responsibilities. Bill O'Neil drew helpful maps, and Judy Bodycote not only created attractive pedigree and descendancy charts but also scanned and enhanced most of

the photographs included in the book. Carol Glesser, Ted Judge's personal assistant, arranged meetings with Ted's cousin, Bette (Webb) Baughman and her daughter Mary J. Baughman Drake.

Researchers traveled to Gold Country towns and to the Pajaro Valley near Watsonville to research and obtain records. They scoured the internet for clues and contacted a number of researchers who appeared to hold needed information. Society member Matthew Berry offered to do the final layout, moving the material from Microsoft Word to Adobe InDesign. Barbara Dyer did most of the indexing, and Laura Spurrier much of the proofreading. Patrick Sheehy offered his remarkable genealogical study of the Sheehy family compiled over many years, providing us with countless photos and information.

The California Genealogical Society is proud to present to Ted and Ellen Sheehy Judge's cousins and relatives this book that we think would have made Ted and Ellen very happy.

### \*Theodore Timothy Judge and Ellen Sheehy Judge

Theodore Timothy Judge was born April 1, 1921, in the small town of Westwood, east of Lake Almanor in Lassen County, California, the only child of Timothy Aloysius

Judge and Hazel Agnes Roussel. Shortly afterward, the family moved to Gibsonville, Sierra County, his father's hometown. When Ted was three, his parents divorced, and Ted and his mother moved to Alameda. On May 11, 1929, Agnes married Albert Sylvan Taylor, at the time a grocery store owner and later an employee of the East Bay Transit Company. Ted quickly grew very fond of his stepfather, whom he always referred to as Dad.

When Ted was about ten, the family moved to the Merriewood section of the Montclair district of Oakland. After a brief move to an apartment nearer Albert's work, they returned to Merriewood, where Ted developed a lifelong friendship with his neighbor, Daryl Boomer. Daryl recalled that Ted, as an only child, enjoyed Daryl's large family and many dogs, while Daryl, on the other hand, enjoyed getting away from the constant mayhem of siblings and pets. Daryl wrote of their different temperaments:

I was always interested in how things were made, while Ted was interested in what they could accomplish for him. He was always much more interested in the results, rather than the details of how things were accomplished.

After graduating from Oakland Technical High School, Ted attended the University of California at Berkeley. He served in the Reserve Officers Training Corps for three years and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics with the class of 1942. Ted worked part time throughout high school and during his college years, which did not leave much time for involvement in many college and social activities. Under "activities," the Cal year-book simply lists Stiles Hall (then a YMCA facility) and the Bancroft Library.

As a result of a mild case of polio in childhood, Ted was exempted from the draft. Nevertheless, shortly after graduation in October 1942, he enlisted in the Army. After a month of basic training in artillery, he was transferred to the Allied Military Government Program. His education and background qualified him for a year-long training program in Far Eastern studies and language taught at Stanford University in Palo Alto. Ted specialized in the Malay and Dutch languages and Far Eastern history, economics and customs. He fully expected to become a "forward observer," a dangerous assignment on the Malay Peninsula. In spite of this training, when the 70<sup>th</sup> Division was assembled for service in Europe in 1943-44, Ted was sent to Camp Adair, Oregon, where he trained as a rifleman with the 275th Regiment of the 70th Infantry Division. He then spent the next fifteen months in France and Germany as a private first class rifleman.

His regiment landed in Marseille December 16, 1944, marched north through France into the Alsace, and then into the southern front of the Battle of the Bulge in the Ardennes Forest. From there, in the dead of winter, they pushed on into Germany, near Bischweiler on the west bank of the Rhine River. In poor conditions, with minimal survival training and without proper clothing or boots, the 70th Division spearheaded the Seventh Army's drive into Germany, south of Saarbrücken.

December '44 and January '45 were among the coldest months on record, and many allied troops were ill equipped for the frigid conditions. One of the few stories that Ted later related about his participation in the Battle of the Bulge described men with frozen toes and fingers and the misery of sleeping in a wet or frozen foxhole. He never forgot the intensity of fighting in this last German offensive of the war. Of the more than two hundred sixty soldiers in his unit, Ted was one of fewer than seventy who survived.

For his service he was awarded several medals, including the Combat Infantryman Badge for action under hostile fire, European, African, Middle Eastern and American Campaign medals, and, eventually, the Bronze Star for heroic achievement. Perhaps typical of his generation, Ted rarely spoke about his war experience and awards. He often remarked that only luck allowed him to survive.

When the war in Europe ended in 1945, because he was a single enlisted man with only eighty-six days of combat, Ted was required to remain in Germany and complete his tour of duty. According to his Army pal, Lou Holger, Ted successfully talked his way into a choice assignment with Special Services in Heidelberg, the position of Chief Clerk of the post. He managed five large theaters and four movie houses, supervising military and civilian personnel in their operation and maintenance and directing entertainment content. His administrative skills in this position earned him the trust and respect of both military and civilian employees.

On completion of his tour of duty, Ted returned stateside and was discharged in March 1946. With his military experiences behind him, he joined the staff of the Pillsbury Company at their main office in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The company, founded in 1872, was at that time one of the oldest and most recognized firms in American food retailing. He

quickly rose to Vice President and Investment Manager in charge of sales and acquisitions in the U.S. and Europe, a position that involved extensive travel.

Ted was a quiet, intelligent man with a quick wit and dry sense of humor. Both patient and honest, he seldom, if ever, complained. He was not without opinions, however, and when asked for his views he would offer them readily, not hesitating to express his convictions.

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Ellen Margaret Sheehy was born on December 29, 1906 in Watsonville, California, the oldest of five children born to Phillip and Loretta (Freiermuth) Sheehy. She was a beautiful, petite woman of sharp intelligence and a soft manner.

When she was young, her family moved to San Jose, where her father became a prominent attorney. Ellen attended grade school in San Jose and Notre Dame High School, and then enrolled in the State Teachers College of San Jose, where she earned her teaching certificate for kindergarten and primary grades in 1929.

On July 5, 1932 Ellen married Dudley P. Sanford, M.D., at St. James Cathedral in Seattle, Washington. They divorced in 1944, after which she returned to San Jose to continue her education. She earned her Bachelor of Education from San Jose State in 1955 and taught in the Watsonville School District and at Harbor Hill School in San Francisco. She next went to work for the Pillsbury Company and later worked as an accountant.

Ted met Ellen Sheehy by happenstance on one of his many trips to California. Ellen and a good friend and roommate were having a ladies' night out in San Francisco. Ted saw an opportunity to assert his gentlemanly traits and offered to buy them a drink and share a quiet conversation. Ellen and Ted were smitten with one another and agreed to keep in contact. Eventually Ted asked Ellen to marry him.

Ellen, however, was a devout Catholic and did not feel she could marry again without an annulment authorized by the Church or the death of her former spouse. Thus began a long

term, long distance relationship that would last for thirty plus years. Ellen finally succeeded in obtaining a church annulment in 1976, at which time Ted was fifty-five and Ellen, sixtynine. On December 18, 1976, in the chapel of St. Christopher's Convent, San Jose, they married in a quiet ceremony attended by close family and friends.

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For two years they lived in Minnesota until Ted retired in 1978. From there they returned to California and made their home in Saratoga for almost two decades. During this period Ted continued to use the financial acumen that had carried him so far at Pillsbury to build his estate and to develop the stock portfolio of the John Sheehy Company, a family-owned business with extensive holdings in the Watsonville area, established by Ellen's grandparents.

Together they shared a love of history and traveled widely both in this country and abroad. Ted particularly loved Ireland, England and Scotland, where he searched for the names and places of his ancestral lines.

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In 1996 Ted and Ellen sold their home in Saratoga and purchased a condominium at The Forum, a senior community in nearby Cupertino. Their plan was to live a maintenance-free life, with unlimited time in which to travel and visit friends and family, but, unfortunately, Ellen became ill with leukemia and died May 25, 2000.

Ted and Ellen made many friends over the years they were together and nurtured those relationships: old childhood friends, neighbors, traveling acquaintances and family. It was this strong connection with people and his own fortitude that supported Ted through his loss of Ellen. He spoke often of his gratitude to his friends, his Army buddies and others across the United States for their ongoing connection with him and Ellen.

Following Ellen's death, Ted continued to advise the Sheehy Company and work on his own investments. It was his passion to keep up with what was happening in the business world and the stock market, and he did so meticulously. He liked a good sharp picture on his TV, not so much for shows or movies but to better view stock prices as they scrolled by. In later years when his health declined and his activities became limited, Ted still remained informed on current events, the economy and the stock market, and could carry on a conversation on almost any subject brought his way.

He enjoyed popcorn and a drink as a "cocktail hour special" before dinner. A premium wine was never turned down when offered, and mints or candy were never far out of reach. He enjoyed a good cup of hot coffee, a sweet roll and any chocolate delight. Most of all, however, he loved ice cream—any flavor, any time, day or night! He was a food critic and a decent amateur cook. He made the best chocolate chip cookies, a good cake and a breakfast fit for a king.

Ted was very conscientious about his personal affairs and was endearingly generous in planning his estate. He provided legacies to his family and to numerous charities and institutions, including Stiles Hall and the Bancroft Library of the University of California, Berkeley, places he had known as a college student. He believed strongly in the value of a higher education and generously provided funding for members of his and Ellen's families. This legacy will live on through these children through many generations.

Ted and Ellen's mutual interest in their heritage is reflected in his instructions that a book of family genealogy and stories should be produced for his and Ellen's kin—this book. It was his hope that others would find joy in the discovery process.

As he entered his eighties, Ted suffered a series of setbacks that left him physically weak. He was fortunate to remain mentally sharp until the end and seldom complained about his declining condition. He was loved and cherished by those who knew him well and was admired and respected from a distance by those who didn't. He was a wonderful provider, husband and friend. Mostly quiet, always cordial and polite, he completed his life with honor, pride and dignity. Ted Judge died comfortably in his sleep at age eighty-seven, June 11, 2008.

### Overview

Timothy Thaddeus Judge, Ted Judge's grandfather, was an Irish immigrant who, in his early twenties, arrived in California about 1852. Settling in Sierra County, he and his first wife had three children, only one of whom survived. Following his wife's death he mined for many years and in his sixties married a much younger widow, Kate Boland, who had seven children. With Kate he fathered a second family of three, the oldest of whom was named Timothy Aloysius. Timothy Aloysius Judge married Hazel Agnes Russell (Roussel). That short-lived marriage lasted only long enough to produce one child, Theodore Timothy "Ted" Judge.

The Boland saga begins with Kate (Boland) Judge's Irish immigrant father, Daniel, with at least one brother, reached California in 1849. He settled in the legendary town of Poker Flat, mined, ran a hotel and operated a store. In the early 70s, Daniel went east to Virginia, where he purchased land on which his brother continued to live. Following his return to California and death a few years later, his widow was forced to sell their mining interests, which spawned lawsuits that continue to be cited in cases and codes today. Their daughter Kate, the first child born in Poker Flat, married as her second husband, Timothy Thaddeus Judge, grandfather of Ted.

Of all Ted Judge's ancestral lines, the one that starts with Jacob Harman and Eleanora Bush, and runs through their daughter Mary Ann and husband Peter Roussel, on to the Roussels' son, James Peter and wife Sarah McMurphy, and then to their daughter, Hazel Agnes (Roussel) Judge, is perhaps the most interesting of all. The Bush-Harman chapter follows this lineage through California, Nevada, Oregon and back to California. Jacob Harman and his much younger wife, Eleanora, were among the earliest American settlers in Yerba Buena, the nascent village that became San Francisco. They left Missouri in the massive first exodus in 1846, not in search of gold, but to populate California and fulfill President Polk's "Manifest Destiny." Many of their travelling companions, including members of the Donner party, never completed the trip. The Harmans claimed land near Mission Dolores, several years after which Eleanora filed for divorce and Jacob died. These two events formed the basis of lawsuits that kept the courts busy for years. After Jacob's death, Eleanora raced through three more husbands, and upon her death left two daughters and much valuable real estate. Her oldest daughter Mary Ann endured a trying marriage with Peter Roussel that moved from the California foothills to Nevada mining country. From there with another husband she moved to southeastern Oregon and finally to Lassen County, California. Mary Ann's son James Peter, "Juniper Jim," was a stagecoach driver in Oregon and later a colorful gunslinger in Lassen County, California.

The classic westward migration of the McMurphys provided the only California Trail diary among the ancestors of Ted Judge. Having married in New England, Abner and Eunice Mc-Murphy migrated first to New York, where their children were born, then to Illinois, then to Iowa. In 1864, both in their sixties, Abner and Eunice, accompanied by almost all of their children and grandchildren, completed the trek west, settling in Lassen County. Their son Silas had already married in Iowa, Elizabeth Kelley, of New England stock but raised in Ohio. They made the trip with a newborn daughter, settled in Lassen County then later moved to Oregon. Sarah, the third daughter of Silas and Elizabeth, married "Juniper Jim" Roussel.

### 冷 Descendants of Timothy Thaddeus Judge

In 1846, a potato blight in Ireland drove 1.8 million refugees to America. Most immigrants initially clustered on the east coast, but after gold was discovered in California in 1848, large numbers came west. Many of Ted Judge's immigrant ancestors were among these emigrants, including his grandfather, Timothy Thaddeus Judge. Timothy Judge came to California during the middle years of the Gold Rush, reportedly in 1852. [1]

Timothy appears to have been very closely related to two other Irish immigrants named Judge who also came to the Sierra foothills: John and Michael Judge, who applied together for naturalization, 2 October 1866, in Sacramento. [2] John, along with Thomas McHugh, attested to Michael Judge's moral character and length of time in the United States. Samuel Deal and Richard Breen supported John's application the same day. John, as learned from his wife Winifred's biography, was born about 1822, immigrated in 1848 and came from North Carolina to California in 1852. [3] Michael Judge, born according to various sources from 1822 to 1831, was said by his daughter to have settled on the Sacramento River in 1852. [4] Several months after John and Michael were naturalized, Timothy filed. On 25 January 1867, in Sacramento, John Judge and William G. Collicott attested to Timothy Judge's character and qualifications. [5] Further research may sort out the relationship among these men.

Both of Timothy's wives were Irish. His first wife, Margaret, came from County Leitrim. His second wife, Catherine "Kate" Boland, the grandmother of Ted Judge, was the daughter of Irish immigrants. Timothy and Kate each brought into their union a number of children from previous marriages, his two and her eight. To this blended family of ten children, they added three of their own. Timothy and both his wives are buried in Gibsonville Cemetery, Plumas County, California. The cemetery exists today, although Gibsonville no longer does.



It is located south of Quincy, about twenty-two miles along and just off the road leading to LaPorte. Driving is at times treacherous; the road is often narrow and winding with no guardrail and may be closed in inclement weather.

Timothy's grandson, Ted Judge, and Ted's nephew, Pat Sheehy, visited this cemetery in the 1990s. It was overgrown. Many towns that Kate and Timothy lived in are gone: Poker Flat, Whiskey Diggings, Gibsonville, Table Rock, and Mt. Pleasant. But there was a time when the mining towns of the Sierra were burgeoning, when gold fever was rampant. There were mines, hotels, dance halls, assay offices, and noise everywhere. Today nature has reclaimed the area. People visit for skiing, hiking and quiet.

The descendancy from Timothy Thaddeus Judge to Ted Judge is very short: Timothy and his second wife Catherine (Boland) Boland had

three children, the second of whom was Timothy Aloysius Judge. The brief marriage of Timothy Aloysius Judge to Hazel Agnes Russell produced but one child, Theodore Timothy "Ted" Judge. Sadly, Ted never knew much about his father's ancestry, which is enlarged upon only slightly here. He would have loved researching this book.

### Genealogical Descendancy

I. TIMOTHY THADDEUS<sup>1</sup> JUDGE was born somewhere in Ireland about 1830.<sup>[6]</sup> He immigrated in 1852, came to California soon afterwards, and died in Quincy, Plumas County, California in 1922.<sup>[7]</sup> Timothy married before 1860, MARY\_?\_, born about 1831 in County Leitrim, Ire-

land. Mary died 16 December 1876 in Gibsonville, Sierra County, California, and was buried there with her daughter Caly in Gibsonville Cemetery.<sup>[8]</sup>

In the 1880 census Timothy, a widower, was mining gold and living in Mt. Pleasant, Sierra County, with his two surviving children, Matthew, a miner, and Nellie, who kept house. [9] Timothy married again, around 1892, perhaps in Washington, D.C., Catherine Margaret Frances "Kate" Boland, a much younger widow with seven surviving children. [10] Kate had a very interesting history of her own, which is discussed in the Boland chapter.

Timothy Thaddeus Judge continued to mine until he was eighty years old, most of the time in Sierra County. He lived long enough to see his youngest son, Timothy Aloysius Judge, return from duty in World War I, marry Hazel Agnes Roussel, and produce a grandson, Ted Judge, in 1921. He died the following year.

Timothy and his first wife Mary had three children:[IT]

[15] Sometime after the 1930 census, she married Stephano "Steve" Varenna, b. 24 Jan. 1879 in Grosio, Provincia di Sondrio, Regione Lombardia, Italy, died in Butte Co., Calif., 2 May 1949. [16] There were no children.

Combining Timothy's surviving children from his earlier marriage, her surviving children from her earlier marriage, and their own three, Timothy and Kate together raised twelve children. She was known for her healing skills and traveled Sierra County to help the sick. [17] The flu epidemic of 1918 hit them hard, however. Kate lost her son Patrick Boland in December 1918; Timothy and Kate's daughter Catherine died the following month. His daughter Margaret and her daughter Sadie Boland Wilson were seriously ill but survived. [18]

After Timothy's death in 1922, Kate went to Reno to live with her daughter Sadie. [19] She died there in February 1933 and was buried next to Timothy in the Gibsonville Cemetery. [20]

### Generation 2

2. Matthew<sup>2</sup> Judge (*Timothy Thaddeus*<sup>1</sup>) was born in Gibsonville, Sierra County, about 1862. [21] He died 20 January 1909 in Napa County, possibly at the state hospital there, of "disease of the brain," believed related to his work in coal mines. He was buried in St. Mary's Cemetery, Oakland. [22] About 1890, he married Mary Catherine Wherity, born in California, 6 July 1865, died 2 March 1951. [23]

Matthew was mining gold in the Sierra in 1880, then is lost track of until after 1900 when his family moved to Berkeley, Alameda County. [24] Mary headed the household in Gibsonville, Sierra County, in 1900. [25]

  - iv. Loretta Josephine Judge, b. 11 May 1903, d. unm. 24 July 1987 in Berkeley. [27] At the time of the 1930 census, she was working as a stenographer in a real estate office. [28]
- 3. TIMOTHY ALOYSIUS<sup>2</sup> JUDGE (*Timothy Thaddeus*<sup>1</sup>) was born in the Mt. Pleasant area of Gibsonville, Sierra County, California, 13 October 1894, and died in Oakland, Alameda County, 6 April 1961. [29] He married first HAZEL AGNES RUSSELL, daughter of James Peter Roussel and Sarah Ellen McMurphy, 18 November 1919 in Susanville, Lassen County, a marriage that ended in divorce shortly after the birth of their son. [30] In 1930 he married second Mary Frederick, born in 1902 in Canada. [31] Evidently there were no children from his second marriage.

When Timothy Aloysius was born, Mt. Pleasant had a population of a few hundred people but was home to a hotel, brewery, school, music teacher, shoemaker and many miners. In the 1910 census he lived with his parents and did odd jobs to make money. [32] World War I intervened. He registered for the draft on 5 June 1917 while living in Westwood, Lassen County, at which time he was a machine hand for the Red River Timber Company in Westwood and still receiving some support from his mother.<sup>[33]</sup> He enlisted in the Army a year later as a member of the 115<sup>th</sup> Engineers. [34] According to a diary kept either by Timothy or another member of his company, he left Camp Kearney by train on 26 July 1918 for New York. The diary described the trip as "the longest game of poker ever played from California to New York."[35] From there Timothy went to "no man's land," somewhere in France. He was discharged from the Army on 24 July 1919 at the Presidio, San Francisco, California. [36] He was



interviewed for the local paper about his service, and was offered work in a number of places. He returned to Westwood to work as a carpenter in a box factory. [37]

Timothy and Agnes, then a waitress in a local hospital, married in a Catholic ceremony in Susanville. The marriage floundered amidst accusations of jealousy, lack of support, and his frivolous spending on a very expensive car. Agnes left Timothy 30 November 1923 and filed for divorce on 7 May 1924 in San Francisco. The case was removed to Lassen County and refiled there 4 December 1924, then apparently transferred to Plumas County. [38]

As a consequence of his World War I military service Timothy Aloysius Judge was given a burial with full honors in Golden Gate National Cemetery in San Bruno, 11 April 1961. At the time of his death, although it occurred in Alameda County, he was living in Stockton, where he worked as a milkman.<sup>[39]</sup>

Timothy and Agnes had one child:

i. Theodore Timothy³ Judge, b. in Westwood, Lassen Co., Calif., 1 April 1921, d. 11 June 2008 in Cupertino, Santa Clara, California; married 18 Dec. 1976 in San Jose, Calif., Ellen Margaret Sheehy Sanford, b. 29 Dec. 1906, d. 25 May 2000, Cupertino. They are both

interred in Mission Cemetery Santa Clara De Asis. Ted and Ellen's lives are described in the biographical chapter at the beginning of the book. Ellen's background and ancestry are covered in Book Two on the Sheehy family.

Hazel Agnes Russell Judge became the wife of Albert S. Taylor in 1929. There were no children from this marriage. Agnes and Albert raised Ted, and he called Albert "Dad." For more information about Agnes's background and ancestry, see the Harman and McMurphy chapters. For Albert's, see Book Three.

4. Leo Raymond<sup>3</sup> Judge (Matthew<sup>2</sup>, Timothy Thaddeus<sup>1</sup>) was born in Gibsonville, Sierra County, 25 April 1892. He died in Sacramento, Sacramento County, 18 September 1974. [40] Sometime before 1920 he married ALICE LACROSSE, who was born in Minnesota, 2 May 1892, and died in Alameda County on 8 June 1995, at the age of 103. [41]

In 1917, when Leo registered for the draft, he described himself as Vice President and Sales Manager, Standard Soap Company, Berkeley, California, and was living in Berkeley.<sup>[42]</sup> In the 1930 census, Leo, Alice and their one child shared their home in Berkeley with Nestor and Irene (Judge) Kenney and their children. [43]

5. IRENE VIRGINIA<sup>3</sup> JUDGE (Matthew<sup>2</sup>, Timothy Thaddeus<sup>1</sup>) was born in California (probably Gibsonville), 28 April 1897; she died in Alameda County, 12 July 1989. [44] In the early 1920s she married Nestor Michael Kenney, who was born in California, 26 February 1900, and died in Alameda County, 1 December 1985. [45]

In 1917, when Nestor registered for the draft, he was a clerk at the Sperry Flour Company, San Francisco, California, single, and living in his parents' home in Oakland. [46]



### \*Descendants of Daniel and Margaret Boland

The Boland story begins about 1849, when Daniel and perhaps a number of siblings, said by descendants to be from Tipperary, left Ireland for the California Gold Rush. Upon reaching California, they made their way up the steep canyons of the westernmost part of Sierra County. The towns where Daniel Boland and his extended family lived and did business are now only whispers of what they once were, if they exist at all: Poker Flat, Table Rock, Gibsonville, Howland Flat, Whiskey Diggings, Fir Cap Diggings, and La Porte.


Daniel settled in Poker Flat, a hardscrabble mining town reached only by making one's way up the steep trails of Canyon Creek. Made famous by Bret Harte's short story *The Outcasts of Poker Flat*, the town once bustled with saloons, three hotels, a master butcher, a jeweler, a Masonic Hall, a dairy, numerous stores and hundreds of miners, who worked for outfits with names like Last Chance, Lucky Hill and Blue Gravel Mining. Daniel Boland at one time owned or managed one of the hotels. By 1856, the population of the immediate area surrounding Poker Flat had dropped from thousands to about 700, that of Poker Flat itself to under twenty. Following a disastrous fire in 1859, the town was rebuilt, and in 1863 the first school opened. Here Daniel Boland mined and managed a business and as the area declined, somehow scraped by. The story is complicated because in addition to Daniel of Poker Flat and Table Rock, there was a second Daniel Boland, a little over ten years younger, who in 1870 was a merchant in Gibsonville and who married Kate, daughter of the older Daniel.

Whether elder Daniel brought his first wife Margaret with him from Ireland or married her in this country remains to be determined, but the latter seems more likely since their first child was born in California about 1853. The first record found for him was his naturalization record in Downieville, Sierra County, I August 1854. The five-year United States residency requirement for naturalization implies that Daniel must have arrived in America before or in 1849. According to descendants, Daniel's brother John mined in the area also, but left California for Virginia, where court evidence suggests he lived on land his brother Daniel purchased. In the 1870 census, a John Boland, age recorded as 29, was enumerated very near to Daniel, the only time he is found in California. [3]

Daniel Boland the elder died intestate in August of 1877. A descendant of Daniel's brother John provided details of an interesting lawsuit filed in Virginia against Daniel's estate, encompassing the years 1879-1883.[4] It reveals that in 1871, Daniel Boland traveled east and on April 8th purchased 271 acres in Albemarle County, Virginia. His brother John subsequently lived on this property, but the title to this land, according to the lawsuit, was never clear. Daniel meanwhile returned to California and according to the suit, ran a grocery business in Poker Flat, which he stocked with goods purchased from J. M. Pike & Company in San Francisco.

Following Daniel's death, his wife, Ellen, was named administratrix. She filed an inventory and appraisal in Downieville that listed \$1,600 in assets and \$2,041 in debts. [5] One of the creditors was J. M. Pike, whom Daniel owed \$734. Pike went after Daniel's Virginia property to collect on this debt and won. John and his family were evicted, and the Albemarle County land was sold at auction in 1883 to pay this and other debts. From this suit it is also learned, among other things, that Daniel was indeed the brother of John and that Daniel's widow, Ellen, had by then remarried and was called "Ellen Boland McKern" [sic]. In the 1880 census, Daniel McKeever and wife "Helen" were enumerated in Poker Flat with an infant daughter Mary and two Boland daughters, Annie and Helen.<sup>[6]</sup>

The lawsuit in Virginia was not the end of the Boland estate's woes. Ellen was forced to sell their California property, including several mining claims, to pay the debts. A small procedural omission in the sale of some mining property rendered that sale void at a subsequent transfer. This decision was appealed, and the case ultimately worked its way to the California Supreme Court, where the decision was reversed. "Estate of Boland" has been cited a number of times over the years following, usually in conjunction with unrealized value of mining interests, and has since worked its way into the codes and statutes of California. [7]

Virginia descendants of John Boland knew nothing of a brother Daniel, only of a brother named James. The story passed down in their family was that John, his brother James, and an unrelated third man came from Ireland to dig for gold in California. Later they returned to the East and settled in Albemarle County, Virginia, where John bought land, and John and James started a dairy business. James then returned to Ireland, and John was forced to sell his land in order to provide James with his share of their investment. [8] If true, it seems that

in this instance the old genealogical adage held true: there actually were three brothers who came to America from the old country to seek their fortune.

### Genealogical Descendancy

1. DANIEL BOLAND was born in Ireland about 1829 of unknown parentage. He died of consumption (tuberculosis) in San Francisco, California, 25 August 1877, and was buried in St. Joseph's Catholic Cemetery, Marysville, Yuba County. [9] Daniel married first, about 1852, MARGARET \_?\_, born in Ireland about 1828, died in California, 1870-1875. [10] Daniel married second, about 1875, ELLEN/HELEN KEATING, born 1854 in New Jersey.[11]

In addition to the census and the Virginia court records, a few tax records were found for Daniel in Sierra County. In 1862 he paid a liquor tax of \$4.17, and in 1863, he appeared on the Internal Revenue Service Tax Assessment List: Poker Flat retail dealer \$6.67; retail liquor \$18.33. [12] The 1870 census records his occupation as miner, but the Virginia court records show he was (perhaps in addition) operating a retail store in Poker Flat.

By his first wife, Margaret, Daniel had two daughters:

- i. Mary Ann<sup>2</sup> Boland, b. about 1853 in California, d. probably between July 1870, when she was counted in the census of Poker Flat, and August 1877, when her father died. She was not named in the lawsuits over his estate.
- ii. Catherine Margaret Frances "Kate" Boland, b. 25 Sep. 1855, m. a widower with the same name as her father, DANIEL BOLAND.

By his second wife, Ellen, Daniel became the father of two more daughters:

- iii. Anne Boland, b. 1876, m. Francis M. Spencer.
- iv. Ellen Boland, b. 1877, m. Herbert Felix Hail.

2. CATHERINE MARGARET FRANCES<sup>2</sup> "Kate" BOLAND (Daniel<sup>1</sup>) was born 25 September 1855 in Poker Flat, Sierra County, California. Kate died in Reno, Washoe County, Nevada, 20 February 1933, and was buried in Gibsonville Cemetery, Sierra County. [13] She married first, 14 November 1875, in Sierra County, DANIEL BOLAND, born about 1838 in Ireland, died 13 May 1891, in Whiskey Diggings, Sierra County. [14] He should not be confused with Kate's father,

who bore the same name and was also an immigrant. His relationship to the family has not been determined. Kate married second, in 1892, possibly in Washington, D.C., TIMOTHY THADDEUS JUDGE. [15] For more about Timothy and their children, see the Judge chapter.

Kate was known as the "First Lady of Poker Flat" by virtue of being the first baby born there. According to her obituaries, on the day she was born, all the businesses in town closed to celebrate. One in particular provided insight into her childhood:

... A few years after her birth the family moved to San Francisco where she attended St. Francis convent, which was located on the site where the St. Francis Hotel now stands.[16]

While the 1860 and 1870 census records for Kate's parents suggest they lived in Sierra County continuously, they obviously spent time in San Francisco, at least in the late 1850s when Kate was young. [17] Miners often removed to the city during the winters.

Kate and her first husband, Daniel Boland, had eight identified children: [18]

That they were married in Washington, D.C. was stated in one of Kate's obituaries. This is curious and is still being explored. It is even more odd since the lawsuit over her father's land in Virginia had been settled more than ten years previously, and the land itself was sold in 1883.

- i. Daniel<sup>3</sup> Boland, b. 3 Sept. 1876 in Whiskey Diggings, Sierra Co., Calif., d. 2 June 1939 in Reno, Washoe Co., Nevada. This Daniel was a stagecoach driver and a "character." He died as a result of the auto accident which killed his brother-in-law, John Wilson (below). [19] He never married.
- ii. Maria Esther Boland, b. on 21 April 1878 in Whiskey Diggings, d. bef. 1900. [20]
- iii. SARAH "Sadie" BOLAND, b. 8 May 1879 in Whiskey Diggings, d. after 1933, when she was mentioned in her mother's obituary. About 1903 she m. John E. Wilson, b. 1873 in Calif.[21] They resided in Quincy, Plumas Co. and later moved to Reno, Washoe Co., Nev. John d. 6 June 1939 of a heart attack while driving near Quartz Point, causing him to lose control of the car.[22] There were no children.

**4. ELLEN<sup>2</sup> BOLAND** (*Daniel*<sup>1</sup>) was born 19 August 1877 in Poker Flat, Sierra County, and died in San Francisco, 26 July 1965. In 1903 she married **Herbert Felix Hail**, born 4 February 1881, in Greenville, Plumas County, died in San Francisco, 11 April 1943. [29]

Herbert's father was editor and publisher of the *Greenville Bulletin* and the *Plumas National Bulletin*, where Herbert trained as a printer and linotype operator. Herbert later worked for the *San Francisco Bulletin* and joined his two brothers-in-law in the import-export business.

Ellen and Herbert had the following children:

They had one child, Donald Walter Boland, born 8 October 1916 in Plumas County, died in Santa Clara, Santa Clara County, 12 August 1997.<sup>[36]</sup>

**6. Leonard Keating³ Hail, Sr.** (*Ellen² Boland, Daniel*¹) was born 6 September 1907 in San Francisco, and died in Marietta, Cobb County, Georgia, 2 May 2000.<sup>[37]</sup> Leonard married first, **Esther Pyrenian**, born 26 August 1911 in Ismit, Turkey, died 28 August 1968 in San Francisco.<sup>[38]</sup> He married second, **Helen** \_?\_, born 14 November 1906, died 6 May 1995, also in Marietta.<sup>[39]</sup>

Leonard graduated from Lowell High School in December 1924 and the University of California, Berkeley, in 1929. He worked for forty-three years in San Francisco as a bonding

# ➢ Descendants of Eleanora (Bush) Harman Foley Woods Holmes

Jacob Harman and Eleanora Bush, the great-great grandparents of Ted Judge, were among the first families to respond to the government's call for Americans willing to settle in California. In 1846, with their young daughter Mary Ann and infant son Jacob, Jr., they made their way west from Missouri, traveling in a massive exodus of more than 500 wagons, over 200 bound for California. With what particular party they traveled has not been determined. After reaching and crossing the Sierra Nevada mountains, they made their way to Yerba Buena (San Francisco), then a sleepy village of at the most 500, less than half of whom were Americans. The trip must have been comparatively uneventful, for had it been otherwise, and had they chosen to join their Donner, Reed and Breen travelling companions who opted to take the Hastings cut-off, someone would have written about the family, and we would know every last detail, including the dinner menu.

In Yerba Buena, Jacob found a piece of land that was to his liking, near the mission and a couple of miles south of town. There he set about building a house and fencing in his forty-plus acres for farming. Even before the *California Star* reported in February 1847 that the Donner party was trapped in the snow on the far side of the Sierra Nevada mountains, Jacob had filed a preemption claim:

To the Hon George Hyde, alcalde or Chief Magistrate of San Francisco and Yerba Buena Sir

The undersigned, a citizen of the District of San Francisco desiring to settle himself in the country and finding it necessary that he should have some place on which to settle he has taken possession of a lot of land East of the Mission Dolores, which is bounded as follows on the North by Hepp— [likely Hoeppener] Land Ranch or farm, on the South and East by a willow swamp and on the west by Garden Leiderdorff [likely estate of Wm. Alexander Leidesdorff].

The Harman Tract, as it came to be called, was located slightly north of Mission Dolores, bounded today by Duboce, Mission, Guerrero and Sixteenth Street, more or less. Jacob built a substantial house and out buildings, cultivated a garden and built up a dairy business consisting of 50-100 head of stock. He left the upper part of his land undeveloped and from it sold his excess wood. Between his farm and San Francisco lay "a barren waste of sand dunes covered with scrub oak." The trail to town was too difficult for wagon travel and had to be negotiated on horseback.[4]

Eleanora was over thirty years younger than Jacob, and their marriage evidently was not made in heaven. She filed for and was awarded a divorce in October of 1849. A division of property was ordered, but before it could be finalized, Jacob appealed the decision to the California Supreme Court on the basis that under Mexican law, then still in place, a Catholic marriage could not be dissolved in civil proceedings. In November of 1850, before the case could be adjudicated, he died. His will provided that of his half of the property, which was becoming increasingly valuable, two-thirds was to go to his son Jacob and one-third to his daughter Mary Ann. Eleanora, in November 1850, almost immediately following Jacob's death, married Michael Foley. [5] The land was ordered to auction, and as the highest bidder, Eleanora bought it back. Eleanora and Michael Foley continued to deal in real estate and finance mortgages, so that by the time Michael died, in November 1853, Eleanora for all intents and purposes was a wealthy woman. [6]

The original Harman claim had taken place during a period when title to land purchased under Mexican law was still being argued in the courts. Clear title to all pre-statehood claims, in fact, did not begin to be affirmed until 1864. In 1853, Eleanora agreed to sell the land at a future date and until then, for \$6,000, the Foleys assigned the lease to a tenant and removed to other property. This deed, it turned out, was defective because it lacked the properly notarized certificate of acknowledgment of a married woman with respect to her separate property. [7] The legitimacy of the original claim itself, moreover, was questioned because of





its nearness to the Mission, which subjected it to a restrictive ordinance. Possibly unaware that the title was clouded, Eleanora sold the property, which sale initiated a string of lawsuits that continued for decades. The legal summaries of these lawsuits, along with accompanying newspaper coverage, provide the only clear record of the twisted history of this small family of four.[8]

Michael Foley died, most likely in San Francisco, in November 1853, and Eleanora again married, in August 1854, Thomas Wood(s), whom she divorced in 1857. Several years later, in October 1859, Eleanora's unmarried son Jacob died, leaving his mother as heir. Less than a month later, Eleanora married yet again, James Holmes, a marriage that was to last only two weeks until Eleanora herself died. That left daughter Mary Ann (by then Mary Ann Harman Harris Roussel) the sole remaining original owner of Harman property. Her story, which is recounted in the following pages, is equally compelling.


## Genealogical Descendancy

I. ELEANORA<sup>1</sup> Bush was born in Germany about 1821.<sup>[9]</sup> She died in Santa Clara, California, 17 November 1859, and was buried in Mission Santa Clara de Assís cemetery, 19 November

1859. [10] As "Laura Busch," Eleanora married in Madison County, Illinois, 7 March 1841, a very much older man, JACOB HARMAN, born in France or Germany about 1788.[11] Jacob died in San Francisco in a cholera epidemic, 3 November 1850, and was buried on his farm near Mission Dolores.[12]

On 20 November 1850, shortly after Jacob's death, Eleanora married MICHAEL FOLEY.[13] Born in Limerick, Ireland, about 1821, he died 9 November 1853, and was buried in the cemetery at Mission Dolores in San Francisco. [14] Following Michael's death, Eleanora married again, 16 May 1854 in Santa Clara, Thomas Wood(s), born in Pennsylvania, son of William Woods and Margaret McLaughlin. [15] There were no children. Eleanora sued for divorce in 1857, and won—once they tracked Thomas down. [16] Eleanora's fourth and last marriage was

to James Holmes, also in Santa Clara, 4 November 1859. [17] Again, there were no children. Eleanora died two weeks later, intestate.

Following Eleanora's death, James Holmes inherited one third of her estate. [18] Several lawsuits were subsequently filed involving her heirs, who were James and her two daughters, Mary Ann (Harman) Roussel and Kitty Foley.[19]

Jacob and Eleanora Harman had two children:

- i. Mary Ann<sup>2</sup> Harman, b. 1 Apr. 1841, m. George Harris, Peter Roussel, and George FRY.
  - ii. Jacob Harman, b. abt. 1846, perhaps along the California Trail, but more likely in Illinois. [20] Jacob died in San Jose, 15 Oct. 1859, "in his thirteenth year" and was buried in Mission Santa Clara cemetery, 16 Oct. 1859.[21] In 1852, at age six, he was enumerated in the California State Census in the San Francisco household of his mother and stepfather, Michael Foley.

Jacob's untimely death has been the subject of many family stories and speculation: (1) that he was subject to kidnapping to persuade his mother to grant clear title to the Harman property in San Francisco; (2) that he was buried up to his neck and left to die; and (3) that he was murdered and stuffed down the well of his neighbor, James Lick. However, his Mission Santa Clara burial record does not mention a violent death, and the local papers do not mention his death at all.

Eleanora, by her second husband, Michael Foley, had two more children:

2. Mary Ann<sup>2</sup> Harman (*Eleanora*<sup>1</sup> *Bush*) was born in Illinois, likely in Madison County, 1 April 1841. [23] She died in Santa Clara, 30 June 1909, and was buried at Mission Santa Clara, 3 July 1909. [24] Mary Ann married in a civil ceremony in Santa Clara, 13 December 1857, George Harris, born about 1829 and died before 20 January 1859. [25] Mary Ann next married at Mission Santa Clara, 20 January 1859, Peter Roussel, born in Guitre, Gironde, France, 17 July 1833, son of Gervais and Maria Roussel. [26] In 1878 in Nevada, Mary Ann,

following her divorce from Peter, married George Fry, Sr., born in England about 1831 and died in Janesville, Lassen County, California, 25 February 1899. [27]

As a child, Mary Ann was one of the first students to attend Notre Dame School for Girls in San Jose, where as Mary Foley, or Harman, or under several other aliases, she boarded starting in 1851. [28] She was only seventeen at her marriage to George Harris, which evidently ended in less than a year with the death of her husband. There were no children.

Two years later, Mary Ann married Peter Roussel. Following their marriage, they lived for a number of years in San Jose and then moved to American Flat, Storey County, Nevada, south of Virginia City on the Comstock Lode. In November 1867, on 71/2 acres that Peter had purchased in 1865, Mary Ann filed a declaration of homestead for herself, her children and her orphaned half sister (Kitty Foley), perhaps to protect herself and her family from debtors. She listed a "dwelling house, two outhouses, one hot or glass house and fences." [29] Two years after that, Mary Ann and Peter sold the American Flat property and moved to a farm on nearby Steamboat Creek in Washoe County, east of Virginia City. [30] Soon, however, the completion of the Virginia & Truckee Railroad through Carson City reduced traffic through Steamboat and Washoe City. This led to a loss of population, which in turn caused the relocation of the county seat to Reno. For the Roussels, this created the need to move again if they were to operate any kind of business. They retained the Steamboat property but moved once again, opening what appears to have been a hostelry or tavern called 5 Mile House, located on Geiger grade (Nevada route 341), north of Virginia City. [31]

The off-again-on-again, stormy marriage of the Roussels eventually ended when Mary Ann left Peter and moved to Virginia City in 1873. She filed for divorce in Reno, 23 August 1875, citing extreme cruelty, physical abuse and failure to provide. [32] Mary Ann and her surviving children moved back to the Steamboat property, and Peter appears to have gone to Bodie in Mono County to mine. He did not die in Santa Barbara, as the children were told, but continued to carry on investments in the mining arena for several years. [33]

In 1878 in Nevada, Mary Ann married George Fry Sr., also on his third marriage. Their combined families totaled twelve children, and they had two of their own. In 1882, the Steamboat property was foreclosed upon; the Frys later sold their belongings at auction and left Nevada for southeastern Oregon and the newly surveyed town of Burns. [34] There they were able to purchase several city lots.[35]

Mary Ann appears to have been a fairly active businesswoman in Burns. She constructed and operated a livery stable and restaurant and worked as a nurse and midwife. [36] In 1893, the Frys purchased land in southwest Lassen County, California, where Mary Ann's daughter Anna and her husband, William Allen, had settled. [37] George and Mary Ann sold their remaining property in Burns and moved to Lassen County in 1895, taking with them their

younger children, Earl and Pearl. [38] The Burns newspaper society columns continued to note their annual migration to visit family, now reversed. [39] George Fry died in Lassen County in 1899.[40]

In 1900, Mary Ann was enumerated as a nurse while living with her son Earl and daughter Pearl. [41] Eight years later, she sold her remaining real estate and moved to Santa Clara County to live with her daughter Anna. She died there, 30 June 1909. [42]

Kitty, like her half-sister Mary Ann, attended Notre Dame School in San Jose, which likely was her home following her mother's death when Kitty was nine. [50] She was provided with a guardian to administer her inheritance until she reached the age of choice; five years later, her half sister Mary Ann Harman Roussel assumed the guardianship, and Kitty joined the Roussels in Nevada. [51]

On 24 December 1877, in Reno, Washoe County, Catherine married Earl Jordan. [52] Perhaps about 1886, Catherine married again, Isaac Winters, who appears to have died shortly after 1900. To support herself and her children, Catherine ran the Oregon Hotel in Burns and in 1910 was working as a school janitor. [53]

Catherine and her first husband, Earl Jordan, had one child, Minnie, who was born about 1879, and is thought to have died of diptheria as a young child in Washoe County, Nevada. [54]

4. Anna Louise<sup>3</sup> Roussel (Mary Ann<sup>2</sup> Harman, Eleanora<sup>1</sup> Bush) was born in Santa Clara California, 28 May 1860, and died in Oakland, California, 19 November 1939. [68] She married, 15 June 1879 in Reno, Washoe County, Nevada, WILLIAM HENRY ALLEN, born in Illinois about 1855, and died in San Jose, California, on 21 Aug. 1920. [69]

Although born in Santa Clara County, Anna was raised for the most part in Nevada mining camps. In 1880 William and Anna were farming in Mason Valley, Nevada. [70] In 1890 and 1894, the Allens purchased government land in Lassen County, California. [71] Later they moved to Columbia, Tuolumne County, and then to San Jose. [72]

William and Anna Allen had the following children:

- i. George Thomas<sup>4</sup> Allen, b. in Nev., 7 June 1880. He d. in Columbia, Calif., 20 Nov. 1897, several weeks after being kicked by a horse. [73]

These dry statistics hardly do justice to one of the more colorful figures in Lassen County history. Jim was only nine when his mother, Mary Ann, divorced his father, Peter Roussel. With her third husband, George Fry, and their combined families in tow, including her six still unmarried children, they moved to Burns, Oregon, where Mary Ann pursued a number of business interests.

When James married Sarah McMurphy in 1889, he was already a dashing figure. He had been a stage coach driver between Burns, where he lived, and Pendleton, Umatilla County,


Oregon. [93] A thin man with a handlebar moustache, he sported a tall felt hat and a red kerchief and carried a pair of pearl-handled pistols. [94] Known as "Juniper Jim," he gave the impression of being a tough gunman, but at the same time was a story teller and musician accordion, piano, and fiddle—and a talented blacksmith as well. [95] He embellished his own reputation as an impulsive gunslinger with wild tales of adventures in Oregon, but was indeed a quick and accurate shot and an agile horseman.

The Roussels' marriage may have been a mismatch from the beginning, but somehow Sarah endured for seventeen years and five children before filing for divorce in March 1906. During these years, first in Oregon, then after 1890 in Lassen County, California—where they raised

livestock on ranches around Ravendale and Smoke Creek—Sarah was often left alone and at one point had to bury her own child in the dead of winter. Nonetheless, "Juniper Jim," had his own following and was appreciated by neighbors for his skills as a handyman. Thus, when Sarah ultimately filed for divorce, people in the area where they lived took sides. [96] Her plea was replete with descriptions of Jim's mismanagement and neglect of their livestock. Jim, in turn publicly announced that if she divorced him, he would take the proceeds from the sale of their livestock and she would be left destitute.

Their divorce was never finalized. Sarah moved to Susanville, and Jim found a place where he could surround himself with his collections, everything from teaspoons to trucks. In 1913, Juniper Jim was arrested for cattle rustling, in actuality a pre-arranged "setup" involving the theft of only two cows, for which the jury returned a verdict of "not guilty." His earlier reputation as a gunslinger and self-described stage robber type made excellent fodder for local newspapers, but the support of his friends ultimately saw him through.

According to his obituary, George was a successful businessman. Starting with a small retail shoe store, he worked up to a large mercantile business, property development, including the first brick building in Burns, and banking. His will left \$14,000 to his descendants. [170]

## 冷 Descendants of Abner McMurphy and Eunice Hastings

Over the course of his life, Abner McMurphy moved from New England to California along a classic migration trail. His parents, Alexander McMurphy and Lucy Burroughs, came from New Hampshire. Abner was born in Vermont in 1798, perhaps in Randolph, Orange Co. [1][2] By 1830 he had married Eunice Hastings and settled in St. Lawrence County, New York, where his six children were born. In 1841, Abner next moved west to Illinois, where he purchased public domain land in Sangamon County, and where the family was still living in 1850. [3] In 1852, they moved to Iowa, first to Keokuk, Lee County, then to Marion Township in Henry County. [4]

As evidenced in the 1850 and 1860 census enumerations, the family lived in comfortable circumstances. [5] It surely was not because of economic necessity that they decided to uproot again and move west. On the contrary, according to the account given by Abner's grandson, Jacob W. Broadwell, the trip had been planned for many years. [6] By this time, all of their children had married and had families of their own. Their widowed daughter, Cynthia, was living with them, but all of the other children, according to Broadwell's account, had farms that would have needed to be sold. Abner and Eunice's children and their spouses and children, with the exception of daughter Laura Ramsey and her family, prepared to move to California.

In April 1864, after supplies had been purchased and other arrangements finalized, the large "McMurphy-Bailey" party, consisting of Abner and Eunice, by then in their sixties, five of their children and grandchildren, and three other families, was ready to depart. [7] Broadwell told of his six-year-old cousin, Abe Ramsey, who wanted so much to go with them and was desolate when told this would not be possible. His sympathetic parents decided to accompany the party in a spring wagon as far as the first encampment, spend the night and return home the next day.

Even though Abner was sixty-five years old at this time, he was made captain of the train. One of the three families that traveled with them was headed by Adam Ludy, who wrote an account of the crossing many years later. [8] Both Ludy and Broadwell recount that in more than one instance it was Abner who effectively led the group and negotiated food purchases and cattle sales along the way.

After the wagon train had crossed the Missouri River into Omaha, they fell in with another train. With the added numbers, they were able to travel fairly safely all the way to and over the Rockies. By the sixties, detailed guide maps had been prepared, with landmarks to look out for, such as Chimney Rock and the Thousand Mile Tree. No doubt the travelers were cheered by the sight of these reassuring guideposts, knowing they were not going astray.

According to Adam Ludy's and J.W. Broadwell's accounts, the main hazards of the crossing, other than dangerous terrain, included the ever-present possibility of attacks, illness (Rocky Mountain fever) and thievery. [9] The Sioux were fighting among themselves, and some were desperate for food or horses. Unscrupulous whites, given the opportunity, would also steal horses and stock, and shots were occasionally exchanged between wagon trains.

Both Broadwell and Ludy reminisced about dogs that accompanied them on the trail. Broadwell had a dog that became so tenderfooted from walking, he asked to take it into the wagon but was denied. Eventually the poor animal became separated from the wagons and was lost. Ludy's dog was so ill-tempered that the men would beat him away from the wagons with a whip. Eventually the dog turned back in the direction from which they had come and by some miracle managed to return to his former home, a journey of about five hundred miles.

The wagon train reached Janesville, Lassen County, 9 September 1864, where Abner traded stock for a ranch and settled his family. [10] Others in the party turned north to Oregon or continued down the Sacramento River valley.

Abner served as Justice of the Peace of Janesville in 1867 and 1868, and in the 1870 census, described himself as a saloon keeper. [11] Whether that meant he owned the saloon or managed



it is impossible to tell; at the time his real estate was reported valued at \$3,000, but this likely was the land in Elysian Valley in which he was part owner. Stock raising would have been difficult for a seventy-one year-old man, and he and Eunice may have moved into town. Abner filed two land patents in Lassen County on I November 1873 for a total of 311 acres. [12] Family members Harper McMurphy, Jefferson Hart and Justus Bailey also filed on that date, and in the 1880 census, Abner and Eunice are seen surrounded by their extended family.<sup>[13]</sup>

## Genealogical Descendancy

I. ABNER McMurphy was born on 23 July 1798 in Vermont. He died in Lassen County, California, I October 1886 and was buried there in Janesville Cemetery. [14] Sometime around 1821, probably in New York State, Abner married Eunice Hastings. Born about 1799 in Massachusetts, Eunice died 15 June 1883 in Lassen County and was buried beside her husband.[15]

2. CYNTHIA<sup>2</sup> McMurphy (*Abner*<sup>1</sup>) was born 26 August 1825 in New York State. [16] She died in Lassen County, California, 31 December 1908 and was buried there in Janesville Cemetery. [17] On 30 April 1846, in Sangamon County, Illinois, Cynthia married William King Broadwell. [18] Born about 1825 in Illinois, William died in Sangamon County between 1856 and 1857 and was buried there in Broadwell Cemetery. [19]

In the 1850 census, Cynthia, William and their two boys were living with William's extended family, along with fifty year-old John Broadwell, likely William's father. [20] Following William's death, Cynthia and her three children moved to her parents' household and, in April 1864, accompanied the rest of the family to California. There, Cynthia lived with one or another of her children until her death.

William and Cynthia Broadwell had three children, all born in Illinois and all buried in Janesville Cemetery in Lassen County:<sup>[21]</sup>



Although married in Illinois in 1853, Hyman was in Iowa by 1854 when his first child was born and probably moved there at the same time as his parents. In 1864, Hyman sold his 800 acre farm in Henry County, Iowa, and with his family, his parents and his siblings, traveled by ox team to California. Once in California, the family settled in Honey Lake Valley, Lassen County. There Hyman purchased land, farmed and raised stock until he died. [28] After Hyman died, his widow, Dolly, continued to live on the farm until 1902, when she moved into Janesville. Her daughter Ina and grandson Kenneth Way lived with her in her home after Ina's divorce, presumably until Dolly's death. [29]

4. Mary<sup>2</sup> McMurphy (Abner<sup>1</sup>) was born 30 June 1832 in New York State; she died 7 June 1909. [51] On 4 November 1852, in Sangamon County, Illinois, she married Justus Rich Bai-LEY, son of Moody and Fannie Bailey. Born on 16 December 1829 in St. Lawrence County, New York, Justus died 23 April 1917. [52] Both Justus and Mary were buried in Janesville Cemetery.<sup>[53]</sup>

The Baileys traveled with her family from Illinois to California in 1864. [54] Mary became ill on the trip west, and they arrived in Chico with only \$10.00. They lived in Chico for a year on a rented farm and then moved to Lassen County, where they evidently purchased one hundred and sixty acres north of Janesville and homesteaded another quarter section nearby. In 1871 they sold the land and purchased the hotel in Janesville, which they operated for nine years before trading it for a ranch, where they established a feed lot for stock. After retirement, Justus served as a school trustee for many years.

The Baileys had five children, the first three born in Iowa, the last two in California:

- 5. MIRANDA<sup>2</sup> McMurphy (*Abner*<sup>1</sup>) was born 26 May 1834 in New York State; she died 22 March 1914 in Standish, Lassen County, and was buried in Janesville Cemetery. [63] Miranda married in Henry County, Iowa, 27 December 1855, Jefferson Hart. [64] He was born about 1829 in Illinois and died in Lassen County, California, on 17 March 1886. [65]

Miranda and Jefferson began their married life in Henry County, where they had a farm. <sup>[66]</sup> On 9 October 1861, Jefferson enlisted in the Fourth Iowa Cavalry, Company K, and served as a second corporal. He was discharged 31 March 1863 at Keokuk, Iowa, for a disabling disease of the hips. <sup>[67]</sup>

When they crossed the country in the McMurphy wagon train, they had three children under five. It is not surprising that Adam Ludy wrote that the women, upon reaching the end of the journey, "had become insane."<sup>[68]</sup> In 1870, the Harts declared little in real estate, but in 1873, Jefferson Hart, along with several members of the family, received a land entry patent for eighty acres in Lassen County. <sup>[69]</sup> Following Jefferson's death in 1886, his sons continued to farm the land for several years. Miranda continued living on the farm until she moved in with her daughter's family, where she lived until she died. <sup>[70]</sup>

Jefferson and Miranda Hart had seven children: [71]

Silas, although probably born in St. Lawrence County, New York, occasionally listed his birthplace as Canada. St. Lawrence County is close to the border, so that may have been possible, but his siblings consistently stated they were born in New York. When he was a boy, his family moved to Sangamon County, Illinois, and in 1856, on to Henry County, Iowa, where

he married. There is no record of his having served in the Civil War, although he was of an age to have done so. There is no way to know if he received an exemption as the only son still at home with aging parents.

Silas and Elizabeth, along with a two-week-old baby, left Iowa for California in April 1864 with the McMurphy-Bailey wagon train. Upon reaching California, they settled in Lassen County, where he farmed and where three more children were born. By 1870, Silas and Elizabeth acquired land in Lassen County valued at \$1,000. [87] In October 1875, Silas and Elizabeth, with her sister and brother-in-law, filed a quitclaim deed to Elizabeth's brothers, Alonzo and Harrison Kelley, for their share of the 164 acres in Henry County, Iowa, they had inherited from her father, John Kelley. In 1879, they added 540 acres to their Lassen County holdings.[88]

Three years later, the family pulled up stakes again and moved to Harney County, Oregon. As Silas's daughter Isabel later recounted:

I was born in 1866 and in 1882 my parents moved to eastern Oregon and settled about twelve miles from Burns toward Silver Creek, at a place we called "Sage Hen Valley." I got all my schooling in California. After we came to Oregon we were twelve miles from school. That was too far for me to go even though we had saddle horses. Our nearest neighbors were four miles away. That was great cattle country, but father raised horses. On a visit to Idaho I met [my future husband] ... and later I went back and married him. [89]

Silas and Elizabeth were still in Harney County when the 1900 census was taken. [90] After their daughter Ida died in Harney County in 1907, they moved to Summit, Benton County, Oregon, where daughter Isabel and her husband lived. Silas died there the following year. A short time later, Elizabeth, evidently despondent, committed suicide with strychnine. Her body was found in the empty house where she once lived with Silas. [91]

Grove Cemetery in Henry County. [94] On 4 October 1855, in Henry County, she married John T. RAMSEY, son of Thomas Ramsey, also of Mt. Pleasant. [95] Born 13 January 1824 in Kentucky, John died on 10 June 1890 in Lassen County and was buried in Janesville Cemetery. [96]

Laura was the only one of Abner's children who did not move to California. She was only thirty-one years old when she died and left, in addition to her husband, a twelve-year-old son and nine-year-old daughter. John Ramsey married a second time in Iowa, probably around 1874, Eliza L. \_?\_ and had six more children. [97] In 1877, Laura's two children, without their father, moved to Lassen County, where in 1880, Mattie at nineteen was working as a governess and "Abbie," twenty-one, was a farm laborer. [98] In 1887, John and his second family also moved to Lassen County, where he died three years later.

1942, and was buried beside his wife. [118] Prior to this marriage William had been married, also in Canyon County, to Frances Shelton, sister of James Shelton, the husband of Isabel's sister Ida. William and his first wife had a son, George, who in 1900 was living with Frances' parents. Frances is presumed to have died since she wasn't found on the 1900 census.

Both Isabel and William, her second husband, were interviewed for the WPA Historical Records survey. He said he opened a store in DeVitt, Oregon, a small town close by Summit, where he became the first postmaster. After selling the store, they moved to the Cascade Mountains, above Eugene on the Mackenzie River, where they bought a store and he served as Leaburg postmaster. They sold that store, repurchased their previous store in DeVitt, and Isabel became the postmistress. [119] This is consistent with the 1930 census of Benton County, where William was enumerated as the proprietor of a general store. [120]

Mary was buried in Gates Cemetery, Crow, Lane County. She married in Multnomah County, 22 December 1897, **William Henry Canaday**, born 26 May 1863 in Eugene, Lane County. William died 14 March 1948 in Springfield, Lane County. He was a photographer and an early gallery proprietor; he opened the first gallery in Burns, Harney County.

[149] Ambrose married in Eugene, 3 August 1927, Edna May Waldron. [150] Edna was born 11 December 1899 in Nebraska, and died in Lane County in April 1976. [151] Both were buried in Gates Cemetery, Crow. [152]

Ambrose was in the sawmill and logging business in Spencer, Lane County, with his brother Marion. [153] He later opened a building supply store in Crow, which he operated for many years. Ambrose was very active in the civic affairs of Crow, serving on both the school board and the museum board. He died when his car accidentally veered off the road into a pond.

Ambrose and Edna had four children, including Marjorie Canaday, born 16 Jan. 1929, who married 3 July 1948, Thomas C. McCulloch. [154] Marjorie died 20 April 2003, Thomas two years later, 22 June 2005. [155]

Sylvester in 1930 was a sawyer at a lumber mill. [158] His brother Marion was boarding in the same household and was working as a truck driver perhaps for the same lumber mill. Sylvester and Aleta had nine children. Oldest was Hazel Laverne Canaday, born 12 July 1941, died as Hazel Bradshaw in December 1987, Lane County. [159] Their son, William Turner Canaday, was born 29 May 1943 in Lane County, and died in Portland, 25 September 1943. [160] Rosalie Canaday was born 20 January 1951 in Drain, Douglas County; she married \_?\_ Armenta, but died under her maiden name Canaday, 26 November 2007 in Gridley, Butte County, California. [161]

Marion operated a sawmill and retail lumber sales business for nearly 30 years in Crow. He and his brother Ambrose started the Canaday Sawmills in 1942 and later opened a retail outlet.<sup>[165]</sup> He and Opal had six children, including daughter Marian Elaine, born in Crow, 6 November 1931, who married Albin Reynolds, born 2 February 1932, died 29 May 2007 in Fairbanks, Alaska. Marian Reynolds died 16 April 2008, also in Fairbanks.<sup>[166]</sup>

## ➢ Descendants of John Kelley and Sarah Palmer

John Kelley, the father of Elizabeth Kelley McMurphy of Lassen County, was born about 1814, either in Pennsylvania, as reported in the 1850 census, or in Ohio, as recorded in 1860.<sup>[1]</sup> He married in 1837 in Washington County, Ohio, Sarah Palmer.<sup>[2]</sup> Sarah Palmer was born in New Hampshire, a descendant of several early New England families, including the Palmers, Dressers, Pembertons, Jewetts, and Cheneys. Her brother, Jewett Palmer, Sr., a War of 1812 veteran, was a neighbor and an important figure in the local Underground Railroad.<sup>[3]</sup>

John, and presumably Sarah, were enumerated in the 1840 census of Fearing Township, Washington County, Ohio, next to her brother Jewett and several doors away from a William Kelly family, perhaps John's parents. [4] About 1855, the Kelleys moved to Mt. Pleasant Township, Henry County, Iowa, where their son Harris was soon born. [5] John farmed his own land there, evidently a large number of acres since it was valued at \$1,800. [6]

When John's will was probated in 1867, those family members still living were in Henry County with the exception of daughter Elizabeth, who had moved west with her husband to Lassen County, California, and is followed in greater depth in the McMurphy chapter. [7] Sarah, along with other family members, including her two youngest sons, Alonzo and Scott, remained on the farm at least through 1870, and probably until 1874, when daughters Eunice and Sarah quitclaimed their share of the farm to their brothers. [8] Sarah, their mother, was not found on the 1900 census, but likely had moved with a daughter to Frontier County, Nebraska, where she was buried in Farnam Cemetery. [9]

The descendants of John and Sarah Kelley and their children are followed here only through the children's generation, at which point daughter Elizabeth married into the McMurphy family. ## Genealogical Descendancy

I. John¹ Kelley was born about 1814, either in Pennsylvania or in Ohio. [10] John died in Henry County, Iowa, 21 April 1867, and was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery. [11] He married in Washington County, Ohio, 31 December 1837, Sarah Palmer, daughter of John Pemberton Palmer and his second wife, Elizabeth Harris. [12] Sarah was born in New Hampshire, some say in Wentworth, Grafton County, 11 February 1811; she died 15 January 1901 and was buried in Farnam Cemetery, Frontier County, Nebraska. [13]

John and Sarah were recorded in the 1840 census of Fearing Township, Washington County, Ohio. [14] About 1855, they moved to Mt. Pleasant Township, Henry County, Iowa, where they farmed and had their youngest child. [15] John died there in 1867 and left his property to be divided among his surviving family. [16] Sarah, along with other family members, remained on the farm at least through 1870, and probably until 1874. [17] She evidently then moved to Frontier County, Nebraska, where she died.

- iv. George W. Kelley, b. abt. 1845 in Ohio. [20] George d. 15 July 1867, and was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery, Henry Co. [21] During the Civil War, he served two years in Company K, 4th Iowa Cavalry.[22]

Pleasant, Henry County, Iowa, the son of Ebenezer and Lucinda (Niles) Chandler, and died 15 July 1918 in Los Angeles County, California. [32]

Robert fought in the Civil War in Company I, 14<sup>th</sup> Regiment Iowa Volunteers. He served more than three years and was captured at Pittsburg Landing in the Battle of Shiloh. In 1880 Eunice and Robert were living in Centre, Smith County, Kansas, where he was the postmaster and at one point cashier of the Smith County National Bank, and she was a member of Rebeckah Lodge No. 47. Following Eunice's death, Robert married Ella J. (\_?\_) and moved to California, where he died.

ried in Henry County, Iowa, 18 March 1875, Mary F. Johnston. [46] Mary was born in Iowa, 21 April 1852; she died 3 January 1919, and was buried in Farmington Cemetery, Washington County.[47]

Alonzo and his family moved to Frontier County, Nebraska, around 1887, where his last child, Edwin, was born, and next, before 1899, to Washington County, Arkansas, where he died.

George served in the Civil War in the 19<sup>th</sup> Infantry, Company I, from Van Buren County, Iowa, and was discharged as a corporal, 31 May 1865. [61] Around 1887 the family, along with Sarah's brother Alonzo and his family and probably her mother, moved to Frontier County, Nebraska. By 1910, Sarah was the owner of her farm; her two sons, Elmer Charles and Fred, were living at home and helping her run it. [62] After Fred married and left, Sarah and Elmer continued working the farm. Elmer married after 1920 but died in 1925; Sarah died two years later. [63]



**Book Two** 

The Ancestry of Ellen Sheehy Sanford Judge



#### Overview

The ancestry of Ellen Sheehy Judge is largely a story of immigrants who found prosperity in the post-Gold Rush years of California, in Watsonville and the Pajaro Valley, where Santa Cruz County meets Monterey County. Of her eight great-grandparents, four came from Ireland, two from Germany and one from Scotland. Only one, Levi Chapin, descended from a line that had lived in America over many generations.

The original parameters of this project were to trace descendants starting with the immigrant ancestor or with the great-great grandparents as appropriate. Thus, Ellen's ancestry is presented in four descendancies: Sheehy-Donovan, Bohane-Minihane, Freiermuth-Kurtz, and Chapin-Curran. In the instance of the Sheehy family, her paternal great-great grandparents did not immigrate, but all except one of their children did. The descendants of these immigrant children remained close over subsequent generations and were the subject of a privately published book, The Sheehys in Ireland and California, written by Patrick Sheehy in 1994. The work done by Patrick Sheehy is so extensive and interesting that we have chosen to begin in Ireland with the non-immigrant great-great grandparents, John and Margaret Sheehy. However, only the ancestral line of Ellen Sheehy Judge is carried down from John and Margaret Sheehy beyond the second generation.

The Bohanes came from the same area of County Cork as did the Sheehys. Capt. John Sheehy, Ellen Judge's immigrant ancestor, married Ellen Bohane/Bowen, the sister of the wife of a school friend from Baltimore, County Cork. No evidence was found that the Bohanes and Sheehys migrated together, but they managed to find one another in this country. Ellen Bohane Sheehy and her husband remained very close to her sister, Honora, and Honora's husband, James Kelly, who lived in San Francisco. In the hope that descendants of the Kellys may hold information that would add to the Irish history of this family, the descendants of James and Honora Kelly are carried down several generations in the Bohane chapter.

While the Sheehy-Bohane line is entirely Irish, the Freiermuths immigrated to this country from Bavaria. George Anton Freiermuth came first during the large German exodus in the 1840s. Settling first in Massachusetts, he arrived in California in the mid-1850s and left many descendants in both San Francisco and Watsonville. About ten years later his younger brother David immigrated with his family, but settled instead in Minnesota, where he died. Of David's children, however, three made their way to California, and one son, Ellen's grandfather, Peter Joseph Freiermuth, settled in Watsonville, and there married her grandmother, Permelia Chapin.

Mary Curran was born in Scotland, but her husband's Chapin lineage, in contrast, goes back to the earliest days of America. We start with Jehiel and Mary (Curran) Chapin, Ellen Judge's great-great-grandparents, whose son Levi left his family in Michigan to come to California. In order to establish a link between Levi and his family, it was necessary to access old letters written between Levi and his Michigan family. For this information we are grateful to the Rev. Fr. Harry Freiermuth of Watsonville, who willingly shared his private research on both the Chapins and Freiermuths, information that he intends to publish in the near future.

The Sheehy story begins in County Cork, Ireland, along the southwestern coast, southeast of Bantry Bay at the edge of one of the most beautiful lakes of Ireland, a small tidal lake known as Lough Ine (or Lough Hyne). There John Sheehy and his wife, Margaret Donovan (or O'Donovan), perhaps having come from nearby Clonakilty, settled shortly after their first child was born. They farmed land just outside the village of Barloge, in Glannafeen townland, in the parish of Skibbereen and the civil parish of Tullagh.

The second of their ten children was baptized in the cathedral at Skibbereen. It is his baptismal record and that of several younger siblings that help identify where the family lived from 1820 until the Irish famine years, at which time at least eight of the children began the gradual migration to America, eventually arriving in California between 1849 and 1860.

There is no evidence that the parents, John and Margaret Sheehy, ever came to America. John Sheehy died in Ireland in or shortly after 1862. [1] Margaret died in or after 1880, when tenancy rights on the Sheehy land passed from her to another Sheehy. [2] Based upon Irish naming patterns of those times, Patrick Sheehy, in his comprehensive book on the family, has postulated that John's parents were Timothy and Ellen Sheehy and Margaret's parents, Jeremiah and Elizabeth O'Donovan, but this remains speculation. [3]


Those children for whom records have been found were all born in Glannafeen Town, except perhaps oldest child Timothy. Here, an attempt has been made to document down to living descendants the descendants of third son John, the immigrant grandfather of Ellen Sheehy Judge. For additional detail on John's brothers and sisters, the reader should refer to Patrick Sheehy's book. [4] In this account, information on siblings has not extended beyond naming their children, and except in a few circumstances where standard state vital indexes were used, information has been taken directly from the book with only minimal confirmation.

Surviving land records carry John Sheehy as a tenant farmer on sixty-three acres in Glanafeen until 1862, at which time
the land and dwellings were handed over to Margaret. Margaret, in turn, handed over the same land (in tenancy) to a
John Sheehy, perhaps a relative but not their son, in 1880.



All the immigrant children of John and Margaret, except for James, settled in or lived for awhile in the Pajaro Valley, along the Pajaro River in and to the east of Watsonville, in the California counties of Monterey and Santa Cruz, which the river divides. James, like several other children, came first to San Francisco, but unlike his siblings, maintained his main residence in that city. Somewhat later, Sheehy cousins and children of Mary Ann Sheehy Shipsey, the sister who had stayed behind in Ireland, came to Pajaro Valley as well. Initially the Sheehys belonged to the old Catholic Church in Watsonville, Our Lady, Help of Christians, commonly called "Valley Church," and many were buried in the small cemetery beside it.[5] Somewhat later, St. Patrick's Catholic Church in Watsonville supplanted Valley Church as the religious center for the many Irish families who settled in the area. Much of the early birth, marriage and death information has been extracted from the records of those two churches and the cemetery nearby.

Thus, we begin in Ireland with John and Margaret Sheehy.

This church stands today just east of downtown Watsonville on the north side of Highway 152. Much of the burial information supplied by descendants has been verified in vol. 2 of D. D. Fletcher, A Tombstone and Vital Records Survey to the Historic Valley Catholic Church Cemetery (Bonny Doon, Calif.: Bonny Doon Historical Publications, 2002).

### Genealogical Descendancy

I. JOHN<sup>1</sup> SHEEHY was born in Ireland, and died there in or after 1862. [6][7] About 1818, one or two years before the birth of their first child, John married MARGARET DONOVAN or O'Donovan. [8] Born in Ireland, perhaps several years after John, Margaret died in or shortly after 1880. [9] In 1880, tenancy rights on the Sheehy land passed from her to another Sheehv.[10]

The land they farmed was located in Glannafeen Townland, in the civil parish of Tullagh. This area lies south of the road from Baltimore to Skibbereen, overlooking the southwest shore of Lough Ine (or Lough Hyne). The family retained tenancy rights until 1945, followed by ownership until 1958.[11]

Known children of John and Margaret Sheehy, all born in County Cork, were as follows: [12]

- John Sheehy's year of birth is impossible to estimate from available evidence. If he married about 1818, he likely would have been born about 1795. The last land record found for Timothy, presumed to have been his father, was in 1829. An article published in the Register Pajaronian newspaper in Watsonville in 1884 states that son John's grandfather lived to be 104 years old, so it would seem Timothy may have been born about 1758.
- The approximate year of John Sheehy's death is based upon land records. John Sheehy was a tenant farmer on sixtythree acres in Glanafeen until 1862, at which time the land and dwellings were handed over to Margaret. Margaret, in turn, handed over the same land (in tenancy) to a John Sheehy, perhaps a relative but not their son, in 1880. See Sheehy, The Sheehys in Ireland and California, 26-29.
- Son John's baptismal certificate names his parents as Timothy and Margaret O'Donovan, while the certificates of four other siblings name her Margaret Donovan. The 1829 tithe aplotment valuation shows a Jeremiah Donovan, farming 65 acres in Glannaveen.
- Timothy, the first child, was likely born in 1819, while the youngest child of record, Patrick, was born in June 1840. Since Patrick was born only two years after his sister Margaret, we assume the mother Margaret had not yet passed her mid-forties. Helen Chalmers Hellman, a descendant of James and a major contributor to the family history, when interviewed in 2006 concurred with these estimates.

They lived in Watsonville, where Patrick was partner in the dry goods firm Atteridge and Sheehy. Patrick and Lizzie were childless and were buried in the cemetery next to Valley Church in Watsonville.

x. EDWARD SHEEHY, b. perhaps in 1843, or in the gap 1831-1835. Great-uncle Edward was identified in family photographs and served as a witness at the 1879 wedding of his brother Patrick, but has not been definitively found in other records. A number of Edward Sheehys of the approximately correct age arrived in New York 1863-1874, but destinations were not included on surviving passenger lists. He was not found in the 1880 census, and descendants speculate he may have come later and then returned to Ireland when his mother became ill or died. Nothing more has been found.

#### Generation 2

2. TIMOTHY<sup>2</sup> SHEEHY (John<sup>1</sup>) was born 23 May, perhaps 1819 but perhaps sooner, in County Cork, Ireland. He died in Watsonville, California, 5 November 1904 and was buried in the cemetery next to Valley Church. [15] Timothy married first, 17 April 1849, MARY ANN SHEE-HY?, in Boston, Massachusetts. [16] Mary Ann, from census enumerations born about 1830 or sooner in either Boston, Mass. or Ireland, died in California, 23 January 1869. The birth record of her daughter Mary states that the mother was born in Boston, and her tombstone in the cemetery at Valley Church reads, "native of Boston," but the 1860 census reads born in Ireland.[17] In February 1878, Timothy married Mary Cunningham. She was born January 1830 in Ireland, died 14 September 1903 in Watsonville and was buried at Holy Cross Cemetery in Colma, California.[18]

Timothy, as the oldest, was likely the first to leave Ireland, settling for a short time in Massachusetts, where he married. His short obituary states he came to California in 1849, but that seems unlikely given the record of his marriage in 1850 and birth of a daughter in 1852, both in Boston. [19] He was not found in the 1850 census or in the state census of 1852. A biography of one of Timothy's grandsons relates that Timothy crossed "the great plains" and his obituary calls him a pioneer.[20]

Family lore also relates that Timothy and his younger brother John, after locating each other in the Sierra foothills in 1853-54, went to the San Francisco area, where they worked and saved their money. The 1872 Great Register of Voters, extracted for foreign-born voters throughout the state, records that Timothy Sheehy, forty-five (a bit young) was naturalized 24 September 1856 in Shasta County, and notes he registered to vote 1868-72 in Monterey County. [21]



Timothy and John together, on 4 January 1859, for \$2,200, purchased property along the Pajaro River in Rancho Salsipuedes, Santa Cruz County. [22] This was only the first of a number of large purchases by the two brothers over the next fifteen years in both Santa Cruz and Monterey counties along both sides of the river. [23] In addition to his Pajaro Valley purchases, Timothy bought property in San Francisco, which he willed to his two surviving daughters. One of his many ranch properties in Pajaro was left to his son Edward, another to his son Patrick and one adjacent to his brother John was left to his son Jerry. His estate, which was not mentioned in San Francisco papers, was probated in Santa Cruz County in 1904 but was not obtained. Timothy's short obituary in the San Francisco Chronicle mentions a "fortune" estimated at \$250,000.<sup>[24]</sup>



**3. Jeremiah**<sup>2</sup> ("**Jerry**") **Sheehy** (*John*<sup>1</sup>) was born about December 1820 in Glannafeen and was baptized January 1821 in Skibbereen Cathedral. [35] Jerry died in California, likely at his ranch in Pajaro Township, in July 1879. [36] He married first, at Valley Church, 7 July 1864, **Catherine Carey**, born about 1837, Co. Cork, who died following childbirth in March 1869. Jerry, "born in Barlogue," married second, January 1871 in St. Patrick's in Watsonville, **Julia Barret**, born 1841 in Clonakilty, County Cork, died in Watsonville, 27 February 1909. [37]

- 5. ELLEN<sup>2</sup> "Ella" SHEEHY (John<sup>1</sup>) was born in January or February 1825, County Cork. She died 27 November 1896 and was buried in Valley Church Cemetery. [46] According to family members, Ella married 8 January 1850, in Boston, Jeremiah Donavan, born abt. 1822 in Ireland. [47] He died about five years later, and Ella married second, about 1863-1864, WILLIAM J. WILLIAMSON, born May 1824-25, in Kentucky, died 29 July 1907, in Monterey County. [48]

The Victorian-style Williamson home, although no longer in the family, still stands along San Juan Road, adjacent to one of the John Sheehy Company farms. Ella had at least three Donavan children by her first marriage and four Williamson children by her second marriage.

Known children of Ella and her first husband Jeremiah Donavan: [49]

- i. Jeremiah<sup>3</sup> Donavan, b. 8 Aug. 1849 in Boston, Mass., d. 15 July 1861, bur. in Valley Church Cemetery, Watsonville.[50]

In 1867, she m. at Valley Church, WILLIAM H. CUPID, b. 1831, d. two years later in Watsonville, 16 Sep. 1869. By William Cupid, Margaret had Albert, b. 1868, d. 20 Feb.1914. [52] She next m., 5 Aug. 1873 in St. Patrick's Church, Watsonville, Jeremiah O'Donovan, b. abt. 1846, Ireland, d. 14 Dec. 1873. This very short marriage evidently produced a daughter, Mollie Donavan, born after her father's death. Mollie died at age four and a half, 22 Nov. 1878. [54] Margaret married third, 26 Dec. 1878, THOMAS KENNEDY, son of Thomas and Mary (Garland) Kennedy, b. abt. 1838 in Sligo Town, Co. Sligo, Ireland, d. Watsonville, 20 Nov. 1898. [55] By her third husband, Margaret had a son George Kennedy, b. 25 Sep. 1879, d. 21 Oct. 1959. [56]

Margaret's second husband, Jeremiah O'Donovan, belonged to a secret fraternal organization, the Knights of the Red Branch. His death was noted in the church ledger: "Death: age thirty, all Sacraments, but blocked from church by [because a member of] Knights of Red

- Bran[ch]." Family members evidently tried to pursuade Jeremiah to separate himself from this organization but were unsuccessful.
- iii. HANNAH T. DONAVAN, b. 1855, Calif., d. 1927; m. 1 May 1878 at St. Patrick's, Watsonville, Byron N. Allison, b. 1857 in Calif., d. in 1937. [57] They had four children, surname Allison: William, b. Jan. 1879; Robert B., b. July 1882; poss. Dorothy (?); and Loretta, b. June 1889. [58]

Ellen and her second husband, William Williamson, had the following children:

- iv. David C. Williamson, b. 9 Dec. 1864-65 in Pajaro Township, d. 29 May 1941, Monterey Co., bur. at Valley Church Cemetery. [59] David m. abt. 1901, Oralia \_?\_ and had a daughter Bernice, b. abt. 1903. They were separated by 1910, and Oralia called herself "widow" by 1920.<sup>[60]</sup>
- v. Mary Ellen "Ella" Williamson, b. 21 Feb. 1868 in Calif., d. unm. 14 May 1940, Monterey Co., bur. in the cemetery at Valley Church.
- vi. John Henry Williamson, b. 7 July 1870-71 in Calif., unm. in 1910, bur. in cemetery at Valley Church.
- vii. James Williamson, b. June 1873 in Calif., unm. in 1900, bur. in cemetery at Valley Church.
- 6. (CAPTAIN) JOHN F.<sup>2</sup> SHEEHY (John<sup>1</sup>), the immigrant ancestor of Ellen Sheehy Judge, was born 28 August 1827, in County Cork, and baptized in Skibbereen, 2 September 1827. [61] He died in the city of Santa Clara, 16 May 1909, and was buried at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery. [62] John married, 10 August 1854 at St. Patrick's Church in San Francisco, Ellen Mary BOWEN (likely Bohane or Bohan in Ireland), born in County Cork, perhaps April 1829 or 1830-1835. [63][64] Ellen died in Santa Clara, 20 January 1924. [65]

Family lore relates that as a young man, John attended private school in nearby Baltimore and then shipped out as a seaman from Bantry Bay, County Cork, in 1846. He quickly rose to ship's master, a remarkable accomplishment for a young man, and proceeded to see a bit of the world. In 1852, he left the sea at New Orleans, opting for the life of a miner in the

California Gold Rush. After crossing the Isthmus of Panama and catching a boat northward, he arrived in San Francisco, 7 December 1852. Unsuccessful at mining, he next worked as

a laborer and participated in a failed ship salvage venture in Santa Cruz County. He then went to Placer County, where he located his older brother Timothy. The two brothers returned to San Francisco, worked and saved their money in order to buy land. Together, on 5 January 1859, they purchased over 200 acres of land in Santa Cruz County, in Rancho Salsipuedes, along the north bank of the Pajaro River. This was followed by another 70-acre purchase across the river by John only, 3 September 1859. [66] Over the next twenty years, John and his relatives continued to buy land in the area, including a number of parcels on the south (Monterey County) side, where land was deemed more suitable for farming.<sup>[67]</sup>

Reportedly John first met Ellen in Boston; she came from an area in County Cork only a few miles from where he had grown up. Meeting her again in San Francisco, they married 10 August 1854. [68] The name Bohane, spelled in the Irish way, is deduced from a number of records. Many family records tie Ellen to a sister Honorah

who married James Kelly of Baltimore, County Cork, who later became president of Hibernia Savings and Loan Company in San Francisco. [69] In 1860 in Pajaro Township, Mary Bowen, age sixty-five and born in Ireland, was enumerated in the household of John and Ellen Sheehy. In the 1870 census, Mary Bowen, age seventy-two and born in Ireland, was a member of the Kelly household. [70] Mary Bowen was the baptismal sponsor at the christening of John and Ellen's twins at Valley Church in Watsonville in 1860. Thus, Mary is presumed here to have been Ellen and Honorah's mother. Neither James nor Honorah, nor Ellen for that matter, were found in the 1850 census, but a birth record for the oldest Kelly child was found in 1850 Boston records. [71]

After the move to Pajaro, John farmed and became active in local civic affairs, serving as a county supervisor for eight years. He owned at least four ranches in Watsonville and Salinas

as well as a number of buildings in San Francisco, San Jose and Watsonville, including the Universal Hotel building in Watsonville. In the 1900 census, his occupation is reported as "orchardist." [72] He and Ellen retired to Santa Clara in the late 1890s and in 1901 formed the Sheehy Company, in which he consolidated his real estate and stock holdings. That company has since passed down through family members. [73]

John and Ellen Sheehy had ten children:

i. Mary Ellen<sup>3</sup> Sheehy, b. 26 Mar. 1856, San Francisco, d. 13 Mar. 1941, Santa Cruz Co., buried at Valley Church Cemetery, Watsonville. [74] Mary Ellen m., 20 Sep. 1881 at St. Patrick's Church, Watsonville, Timothy J. Horgan, b. 28 Sep. 1856, d. Santa Cruz Co., 11 June 1933.

Timothy started in the grain and feed business, developed a large fruit shipping business and later became active in real estate and insurance. They evidently did not have any children.[75]

James changed his name from Sheehy to Shea evidently about the time he came to America, which was in 1852 according to his obituary. Descendants of his siblings report that their families were not pleased with the change in spelling. Several family stories relate that James first went to Dublin, either for schooling or to earn money for his passage. Unlike other family members, he came directly to San Francisco. According to city directories, if it was the same James Shea (which is uncertain), he worked as a boatman, a waiter, a drayman and a porter, all before 1866. In 1868 James became a partner and owner of Shea, Bocqueraz and McKee, which a few years later became Shea, Bocqueraz and Co., one of the largest wholesale liquor businesses on the Pacific Coast.

The 1890 Great Register records James Shea was naturalized 6 August 1866 in San Francisco 4<sup>th</sup> District court, but at age fifty-one, suggesting a birth year some three years after his actual year of birth. The 1872 Great Register accurately recorded his age as thirty.

The Shea family was socially prominent in San Francisco. Two sons attended Santa Clara College. James built a grand house at Golden Gate Avenue and Steiner and a number of other houses, which he gifted to his daughters at marriage. He occasionally traveled abroad and may have returned to Ireland to help settle family affairs. He undoubtedly left a sizeable estate, the details of which were lost in the earthquake and fire of 1906. Annie Shea died in 1919 and left an estate valued at almost \$360,000 to be split among her four surviving daughters, Margaret Nolan, Annie Tobin, Ella Chalmers and Elizabeth Murphy, and the two children of her deceased son Leo, Anita McDonald and John Shea. [92]

Over a period of thirteen years, tuberculosis caused the death of five of the Shea children, John, Leo, Mollie, James and Rose. Along with their parents and several more siblings, they were buried in the family vault at Holy Cross Cemetery in Colma. James and Annie Shea had ten children, all born in San Francisco: [93]

**II.** Margaret "Madge" Sheehy (*John*<sup>2,1</sup>) was born 28 January 1862 in Watsonville. She died in San Jose, 10 November 1952, and was buried in Mission Cemetery, Santa Clara. He served six years as the City Attorney of Watsonville and as deputy collector of internal revenue and later became senior partner in the accounting firm Sheehy & Helwig. [121]

Seattle, Dr. Dudley Phelps Sanford, b. 8 Nov. 1899, died Carmel Valley, Calif., 4 July 1985. They divorced in 1944, and the marriage was formally annulled by the Catholic Church in 1976.



# 冷 Descendants of Jeremiah? Bohane and Mary Minihane

Capt. John F. Sheehy, the immigrant Sheehy ancestor of Ellen Sheehy Judge, married in San Francisco, 10 August 1854 at St. Patrick's Church, Ellen Mary Bowen (Bohane or Bohan in Ireland), born in County Cork, Ireland, between 1830 and 1835. Ellen likely came from a large Irish family, but the only members thus far identified have been her sister Honora Bowen Kelly, who lived in San Francisco, their mother, Mary, and two probable sisters who also came to San Francisco: Catherine and Margaret Bowen.

Thus, we start this descendancy in Ireland with Mary Bohane (likely née Minihane) and her husband, believed by the family to have been named Jeremiah. The choice of the name Jeremiah, tenuously chosen by descendants, was based upon traditional Irish naming patterns. Each of the two known daughters who married and bore children named her second son either Jeremiah or Jerome, as would have been expected in families who clung to tradition, even in a new land. Ellen's death certificate names her father as "J. Bohun."

## Genealogical Descendancy

I. JEREMIAH?¹ BOHANE was born in Ireland and perhaps died there. He married, probably in Ireland, a woman named MARY \_\_?\_\_, written on her daughter Ellen's death certificate to be MINIHANE, born there about 1798, who came to this country and appears to have been the mother of the sisters Honora(h) and Ellen, with whom she lived at various times.<sup>[1]</sup>

In the 1870 census of San Francisco, the James Kelly household included James's wife Honora(h) and an older woman, Mary Bowen, age seventy-two, born in Ireland. The 1860 census of Santa Cruz County, household of John and Ellen Sheehy, included Mary Bowen, age sixty-five, born in Ireland. Mary Bowen served as a godparent at the baptism of Ellen and John's twins. The assumption is made here that Mary was the mother of Ellen and Honora.

Also in 1860, two unmarried Bowen females were enumerated in the James Kelly household: Margaret, twenty-three, and Catherine, twenty, born about 1836-1840, both described as dressmakers. [5] That census does not indicate relationships; they may have been sisters, cousins or even granddaughters of Mary. City directories indicate that Mary Bowen, widow, and Miss Catherine Bowen, seamstress, joined the James R. Kelly household at 42 Ritch Street in 1860-61. In 1862, Miss Kate Bowen and Mary Bowen, widow, were listed at 5 Minna Street, after which they were no longer together. No listing was found at any time for Margaret. A "Mrs. Mary Bowen," age seventy-eight, died in San Francisco, 17 April 1876, with no identifying information in her death notice. [6]

Parental names remain unproven, but the surname Bohan(e) (or Bouhane) is certain. The death certificate of Ellen Sheehy names her father "J. Bohun." Bohan was appended by family members as a middle name to Honora Kelly's unmarried daughter, Margaret.<sup>[7]</sup> Griffith's

Valuation (an Irish tax roll) records a number of families with this surname in the area surrounding Skibbereen. The online website of the Irish Family History Association indexes

several Ellen Bouhans, an Honora Bouhan, a Margaret Bouhane and a number of Catherines baptized between 1830 and 1840, the years in question.

Ellen's death certificate names her mother \_ ?\_ Minihane. Skibbereen baptismal records include the baptisms of five daughters to Jeremiah Bohane and Mary Minihane: Anne (1814), Margaret (1817), Honora (1819), Mary (1822), and Catherine (1825), but these birth years are ten to fifteen years before those of the Bowen girls. [8] Nonetheless, the older Margaret, Honora and Catherine may have died and the names given to younger daughters for whom no record was found. Related Irish families, moreover, often used the same set of names for their children; inasmuch as the surnames were common in the area, the coincidence is not considered unusual.

As to immigration, a Jeremiah Bohane evidently came to this country from the village of Kilcrohane via Quebec in 1847 with his brother Denis, with ages, unfortunately, not stated. An unnamed sister, placed an adver-

tisement in the *Boston Pilot*, requesting any news of him. <sup>[9]</sup> The 1850-1853 tax list of Kilcrohane (slightly west of the Sheehy ancestral home) lists a Jeremiah Bohane, perhaps or perhaps not the father, still in Ireland.

- 2. ELLEN MARY<sup>2</sup> BOHANE/BOWEN (*Jeremiah?*<sup>1</sup> *Bohane*) was born in County Cork, Ireland, April 1830-1835, depending upon which census is to be believed. Ellen died 20 January 1924, in Santa Clara County, California. She married, according to family members, at St. Patrick's Catholic Church, San Francisco, 10 August 1854, John F. Sheehy, son of John and Margaret Sheehy, born 28 August 1827 in Glenafeen (or Glanafeen) Townland, County Cork, died 16 May 1909 in Santa Clara. John and Ellen had ten children, and are described in much greater detail in the preceding chapter on the Sheehy family.
- **3. Honorah**<sup>2</sup> **Bohane/Bowen** (*Jeremiah*? *Bohane*) was born about 1830 in Ireland, most likely County Cork, and died 24 March 1893 in San Francisco. [14] She married, either in Ireland or in Boston, about 1848-1849, **James Roberts Kelly**, born 9 September 1827 in Baltimore, County Cork, died 28 September 1912 in San Francisco. [15]

According to his obituary, James was educated in Ireland to be a barrister. Recorded as a "painter" in Boston in 1850, James, after coming to San Francisco in 1855, first was a partner in several painting supply import businesses. [16] About 1870 he became a director of the Hibernia Bank, along with his many other businesses, which included at the time of the 1880 census, a fruit dealership. [17] In 1890 he was named president of Hibernia Savings and Loan Society. James was buried in Mission Cemetery in Santa Clara, but there is no record of Honora there. Honora had died in 1893 and according to her obituary, was buried in old Calvary Cemetery. Her remains presumably were reinterred in Holy Cross Cemetery in Colma when the San Francisco cemeteries were relocated.

James and Honorah had six children as follows:

About 1889, Sarah married William Simpson Lyle, son of Joshua and Ann (Simpson) Lyle, born 21 March 1842 in Machias, Maine, died 27 November 1915 in San Francisco. William was described in the 1900 census as "mining expert," but in 1910 as "farmer." His mother-in-law's obituary describes her son-in-law as "the well-known mining capitalist of the Nevada block." William was buried at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery.

William and Sarah Lyle had the following children, both born in San Francisco: [25]

He married about 1883, Frances E. "Fannie" Raleigh, born 1858 in Oregon, died 25 June 1922, Marin County, California. Both Alfred and Fannie were buried at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery. Alfred, like his father, was a banker.
- 20. Margaret was seven months old in the 1860 Census, ten years old in 1870 and seventeen in 1880. Her years of birth and death are consistent with the Margaret Kelly buried at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery in the Kelly plot.
- 21. Mary was six in the 1870 Census, fourteen in 1880. She was evidently alive (but unnamed) at the time of her mother's death in 1893, but was not found in the 1900 Census with either her father or her sisters Margaret and Sarah.

[32] He married **Louise G. Queen**, born in Kentucky, 18 January 1892, died 11 November 1983. [33] George was a commercial artist. He and Louise had three daughters, all of whom were evidently living in 1997, and a son, George Blake Lyle, Jr., born 26 September 1931 and died 21 August 1959. [34]
- 7. Mary Irene<sup>4</sup> Kelly (Alfred Roberts<sup>3</sup> Kelly, Honora<sup>2</sup> Bowen, Jeremiah?<sup>1</sup> Bohane) was born October 1884, died as "Renee" K. Palmer in the Spanish Flu epidemic, 14 March 1919, Portland, Oregon. She is buried in the Kelly family lot at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery, Santa Clara. [35] Renee married in San Francisco, April 1910, Edward Alexander Palmer, son of Warren Sherman Palmer of Oakland. [36] Edward, a University of California graduate in engineering, was born 18 June 1885, and died November 1965 in or near Edgewood, New Jersey. [37]

The newly married couple was enumerated in 1910 in Klamath Falls, Oregon, where his occupation was recorded as civil engineer. At the time of the 1920 census, Edward was a "widower" in Lafayette County, Oregon, but married again within the year, Josephine Hum-

mel.<sup>[39]</sup> According to family members, Edward then left for South America on an engineering assignment and did not maintain contact with his family. The children were raised in the homes of various relatives.<sup>[40]</sup>

Edward is mentioned as deceased in the 1937 University of California alumni directory and in his father's 1940 obituary. [41] Ship passenger lists, however, show that he arrived in New York City, 20 November 1928, on the *SS Harold Walker* from Aruba. [42] He provided full identification and a current address in Edgewood, New Jersey. He later took out a Social Security card in New York and married again, Helen \_?\_(maiden name Wossell). He died in or near Edgewood; his obituary in the *Trenton Times* does not mention children. [43]

They were married just following the 1906 earthquake and fire in a newsworthy ceremony that took place in the ruins of St. Dominic's Catholic Church in San Francisco. [49] John Ewing was a graduate of Notre Dame and a professor there for a number of years; he was serving as a Justice Department lawyer at the time of his death. Ethel Kelly Ewing was buried at Santa Clara Mission Cemetery.



# ➢ Descendants of Jehiel Chapin and Permelia Parsons

Chapin born in Devon, England in 1598." With these words, Jeffrey and Marie Charnley began their family history, based largely upon old family letters and titled, *The Jehiel Chapin (Jr.) – William Clement Johnson Family History and Reunion Story: Seven Generations in Michigan.* The information in this publication is all that has been found to document the connection between Levi Chapin, son of Jehiel and Permelia (Parsons) Chapin, who came to Pajaro Valley in Monterey County, California, and the siblings he left behind in Michigan. [2]

Following his father's death in an accident near their home in Yates County, New York, Levi followed an uncle and several of his brothers to Michigan, arriving between 1844 and 1848. After the group reached Michigan, all stayed except Levi. He moved on to California a few years later, arriving in 1852. Because only Levi came to California, his Michigan siblings are followed in this history very minimally, through their lives and those of their children whom we can identify. Those who wish to trace the Chapins back to the immigrant are referred to the Charnley book and to two more comprehensive Chapin genealogies. [3]

Unless otherwise confirmed and noted, information has been taken from the Charnley book and from documents in the possession of Fr. Harry Freiermuth of Watsonville. We start our Chapin history, then, four generations back from Ellen Sheehy Judge, with Levi's parents, Jehiel and Permelia Chapin of Yates County, New York.

# Genealogical Descendancy

**I. JEHIEL**<sup>1</sup> **CHAPIN** was born 29 May 1787 in Hampshire County, Massachusetts, and died in Italy Hollow, Yates County, New York, 6 April 1839. [4] Jehiel married, 28 December 1814,

**PERMELIA PARSONS**, daughter of Wareham Parsons of Prattville, Steuben County, New York, born January 1790, also in Massachusetts, died in Michigan, 1873. Following Jehiel's death, Permelia married Jared Watkins. They lived in Grattin Township, Kent County, Michigan, at least through 1870, which is probably where she died.

2. HORATIO<sup>2</sup> CHAPIN (*Jehiel*<sup>1</sup> *Chapin*) was born 14 July 1816 in New York and died during a typhoid fever epidemic in Kent County, Michigan, 18 December 1856. [6] Horatio, the last of the brothers to settle in Michigan, married about 1839 in New York, ELIZABETH LINDSLEY, born about 1823 in Pennsylvania; evidence seems to suggest she married again, William Chipman. [7]

Horatio and Elizabeth Chapin had the following children, all but the last born in New York:<sup>[8]</sup>

- **3. Jehiel**<sup>2</sup> Chapin (*Jehiel*<sup>1</sup> *Chapin*) was born in November 1819, in Prattsburg, Steuben County, New York, and died in Michigan, 19 April 1901. [13] Jehiel, the third in his family line to be named Jehiel but the second to be followed here, married, 30 March 1847, **Laura M. Foskett**, born 9 April 1809 in Massachusetts, died in Michigan, 8 May 1889. [14] Both were buried in Lakeview Cemetery, Montcalm County.

Jehiel and Laura Chapin had one child:

- 4. Levi P.<sup>2</sup> Chapin (*Jehiel*<sup>1</sup> *Chapin*) was born 15 August 1822, in Prattsburg, Steuben County, New York, and died 6 August 1865, near Watsonville, California. Levi married in San Francisco, 21 September 1857, Mary Curran, daughter of Hugh and Agnes Curran of Dumfries, Scotland. Mary was born about 1832 in Scotland and died in early 1866, in or near Watsonville. [19]

Levi followed his brothers and uncle from Steuben County to Yates County, New York, and then on to Michigan. In 1850, still unmarried at twenty-seven, he was living and working as a gunsmith in Marshall, Calhoun County, Michigan. [20] In 1852 Levi joined a large group of Marshall residents, lured by gold fever, and made the difficult trip to the California gold fields, 105 days as he described in a letter home to his brother, Jehiel. [21]

Discouraged by the hard work involved in mining, he first turned to making shingles in the California redwood logging country and then eventually turned to farming, settling first on

rented land near Mission San Jose. Following his 1857 marriage and the birth of his first child, Permelia, he and Mary moved to a farm near Watsonville, where their second child, John, was baptized in 1860.<sup>[22]</sup>

In July 1861 Levi purchased property at the mouth of the Salinas River in Monterey County, located in what was called the "City of St. Paul," in 1860 a swampy area more commonly known as Paul's Island. The following day he purchased a ferry boat franchise on the Salinas River, which he later sold. [23] Several years later he briefly held a gold mine claim in Tulare County. During this period he farmed on 160 acres of leased land, part of San Cayetano Rancho in the Pajaro Valley in Monterey County. [24] Levi's land, inherited by his minor children was later sold to their guardians. [25] In 1865, "in his forty-third year," Levi P. Chapin died; less than a year later, Mary died at age thirty-four. Mary's sister Ellen, wife of Thomas Jamieson, and her family arrived from Rhode Island shortly after her death and subsequently raised Levi and Mary's surviving children.

Here we call her Permelia, which is entirely arbitrary.

# 冷 Descendants of David Freiermuth and Juliana Kurz

David Freiermuth, the great-grandfather of Ellen Sheehy Judge and the person with whom we begin, came to this country from Bavaria about 1856 and settled in Minnesota. The story of how this German family came to settle in Watsonville, however, starts somewhat earlier with the arrival of David's older brother, who came to this country in the early 1840s and settled in Massachusetts. George A. Freiermuth, a "tinsman," married on 29 January 1843, at Taunton, Massachusetts, Sarah Louisa Lambright. [1] Shortly after 1850, perhaps lured by better prospects in California, the family—by that time including three children—went west. George A. opened a traveling tinware business based in Watsonville which served people over a wide area south of San Francisco. [2] His younger brother David, who had stayed behind and married in Bavaria, came to this country over ten years later with his wife and three children. He settled in Goodhue County, Minnesota, probably before 1857, and some seven years later, fought in the Civil War. In 1869 he was awarded a homestead grant of 160 acres in Hay Creek Township, Goodhue County, and farmed it probably up to his death in 1882. Surely the two brothers must have corresponded, but they may never have seen each other after leaving their homeland.


While David stayed and died in Minnesota, three of his seven identified children went west. The first to leave was Peter J. Freiermuth, the grandfather of Ellen Margaret Sheehy. He left Minnesota about 1868 and arrived in Watsonville in 1871, where he apprenticed as a tinner with his uncle. He and his wife Permelia had eleven children, four of whom died quite young. Peter's sister Katherine may have stayed in Minnesota until her father died in 1882. However, she too went west and in 1883 married Martin Weber in San Francisco. He is not clear when their younger brother Charles followed. His first listing in San Francisco was in the 1886 city directory, as a "tinner," like Peter. Charles remained single for many years in San Francisco, eventually marrying in 1908 a younger woman, who died a few years later.




This story thus begins in Edesheim, Bavaria, a small village located in the southern Pfalz halfway between Neustadt and Landau, and in Minnesota with the immigrant David, the great-grandfather of Ellen Sheehy Judge.

## Genealogical Descendancy

**1. David¹ Freiermuth** was born 7 February 1823 in Edesheim, Pfalz, Bavaria (Bayern), and died in Hay Creek, Goodhue County, Minnesota, 18 Jun 1882. [5] He married, 4 September

1845, in Edesheim, **Juliana Anna Kurz**, daughter of Casparo Kurz and Barbara Mees. [6] Born 5 August 1825 in Edesheim, Juliana Anna died in Red Wing, Goodhue County, 19 May 1913. [7]

David and Juliana, along with their three oldest surviving children came to this country between 1851 and 1857. [8] David served in the Civil War in the Second Regiment, Minnesota

Infantry Company F, from 28 September 1864 to 11 July 1865. [9] Following the war, in 1869, he applied for and was awarded a homestead grant of 160 acres in Goodhue County, the southeast quarter of Section 18, Hay Creek Township. His service evidently left him somewhat debilitated, for in 1873 he appealed in a notarized letter to the German government to allow two young men named Fitschen to emigrate and help him work his land in Hay Creek. [10] David's occupation was listed as a farmer in the 1870 and 1880 census enumerations. [11] The agricultural schedule of 1870, taken in conjunction with the 1870 census, lists both improved and unimproved acreage each at 80 acres, with a cash value at \$3000. At that time he was raising spring wheat and corn; the numbers of livestock were such that they probably were intended for food. [12]

David Freiermuth's estate was probated in Goodhue County beginning in July 1882. [13] Son Anthon(e) and daughter Frances stayed in Minnesota, but within a few years daughter Katie and son Charles went west. Both David and Juliana were buried in Calvary Cemetery in Red Wing.

[20] Frances married in Red Wing, 28 May 1874, **John Schroeder**, born August 1850 in Germany, died in Hennepin County, before 1910. [21]

John appears to have been a man of many talents. On daughter Mathilda's birth record, he is listed as a farmer, whereas in the 1880 census of Red Wing, his occupation appears as "police officer." In 1881 on Pearl's birth record, he was a "cooper." In 1900 he was a city watchman. [22]

John and Frances Schroeder had four children: [23]

or "Amelia") was born 15 August 1858 in nearby San Jose, Santa Clara County, and died in Watsonville, Santa Cruz County, 20 January 1902. [25]

Peter is said by family members to have left Minnesota in 1868.<sup>[26]</sup> He first appeared in Watsonville in 1872, where he served a short apprenticeship with his uncle, George A. Freiermuth, a tinner who, with his son-in-law, operated a hardware business partnership, Freiermuth & Steigleman.<sup>[27]</sup> Peter then moved to San Francisco for several years in order to apprentice as a plumber. With his new skills, he returned to Watsonville, where in 1882 he founded his own hardware, plumbing and sheetmetal business, the P. J. Freiermuth Hardware and Plumbing Company.<sup>[28]</sup>

In 1888, for \$400, Peter purchased a small, unimproved city lot on Second Street in Watsonville, which may have been purchased with his wife's inheritance and on which their residence was constructed. [29] The company originally stood where City Hall is now located, but moved to Van Ness Avenue in Watsonville in 1897. Following Peter's death in 1912, the company passed to his son Harry.

Permelia inherited property as a child when her parents died. Interestingly for those times, she must have retained her separate property, for in 1902, shortly before her death, she wrote a short will in which she bequeathed her "house and lot on Second Street" to her daughter Loretta, any separate cash to her sons Vincent and George, and her wedding ring to her son Harry. [30] Harry and Loretta at some point before 1910 assumed the care of their younger siblings. [31]

Peter and Permelia had the following children, probably born in Watsonville, many of whom died of diptheria:<sup>[32]</sup>

4. Katherine Barbara<sup>2</sup> Freiermuth (*David*<sup>1</sup>) was born 1 May 1857 in Goodhue County, Minnesota, and baptized 10 July 1860, in St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Red Wing. She died in San Francisco, California, 25 April 1942. On 4 May 1875, in St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Red Wing, Goodhue County, Minnesota, Katherine married Peter Behring. In 1883 in San Francisco, using the name Freiermuth, Katherine married carpenter, Martin Weber, born March 1847 in Hessen-Darmstadt, Germany, died in San Francisco, 24 Jan 1905. Whether the Behring marriage ended in an annulment or a death is not known. [38]

Martin was a carpenter. He and Katherine had the following children, all born in San Francisco:<sup>[39]</sup>

- 5. Anthon(E) (Anton) George<sup>2</sup> "Tony" Freiermuth (*David*<sup>1</sup>) was born about 1864 in Minnesota and died there in Goodhue County, 3 Aug 1907. He married in Minnesota, 12 February 1895, Louise Bremer (sometimes "Elizabeth"), born 1 September 1872 in Germany, died 31 January 1933 in Minneapolis. Following Anthon(e)'s death, in about 1910, Louise evidently had a son, Francis, by Gust Gusterson, but according to a descendant, did

not marry him.<sup>[45]</sup> She did marry, about 1914-15, Carl Lofgren, by whom she had a daughter, Lucile, in 1915. Louise died as Louise Lofgren.<sup>[46]</sup>

Anthon(e) was a tinner. He drowned in a tragic accident on the nearby Mississippi River when his rowboat capsized, leaving not only his wife and four children, but also his aged mother. His obituary names his sisters Frances Schroeder of Minneapolis and Katie Weber of San Francisco, and his brother Charles of San Francisco, but oddly omits his brother Peter. [47]

Julia married about 1905 **William Harry Weisgerber**, born 1 September 1874 in Galena, Jo Daviess County, Illinois, died in Hennepin County, Minnesota, 15 December 1936. [51]

William was a salesman throughout all census enumerations. He and Julia had one child, about whom little could be learned:

7. Pearl Catherine<sup>3</sup> Schroeder (*Frances*<sup>2</sup>, *David*<sup>1</sup> *Freiermuth*) was born 18 January 1881 in Red Wing, Goodhue County, Minnesota, and died in San Diego County, California, 9 January 1953. [53] Pearl married, perhaps about 1908, Charles P. Flanigan. [54] In 1910, they were in South Dakota and in 1920, Greene County, Alabama. In 1930, Pearl was a "widow" living with her two daughters and managing a hotel in San Diego, California.

Pearl and Charles Flanigan had two daughters, both born in South Dakota: [55]

At the death of his father in 1912, Harry became president and manager of the P. J. Freiermuth Company, the hardware, plumbing and sheetmetal business his father had founded. Under his leadership, the company branched out to include the manufacture of well casings and roofing. [59] Following Harry's death, the business passed to his younger brother George.

Henry and Lou Freiermuth had four children:[60]

They had five children, as related in the Sheehy chapter.

George became the president of the P. J. Freiermuth Company following the death of his brother Harry and eventually, in 1945, sold the business and retired.<sup>[64]</sup> He and Adele had one child:

Henrich who died in Los Angeles County, 7 October 1971. [66] Katie married about 1918, **John Martin Henrich**, born 22 July 1881 in Germany, died in San Mateo County, 20 July 1952. [67]

Following the death of her mother in 1942, Katherine was appointed guardian to manage the affairs of her sister Frances Mary Weber, who had been a patient at Napa State Hospital for a number of years.<sup>[68]</sup>

#### Overview


Ted Judge saw little of his biological father after his parents divorced when he was a toddler. His mother married again, Albert Sylvan Taylor, her friend of many years, who then adopted Ted in all but name. While Ted's biological paternal ancestors immigrated from Ireland to California, his stepfather's ancestors can be traced back to the earliest days of our nation. Their descendants followed a classic migration pattern, settling for a while in Ohio, Missouri, and Iowa before reaching California. While they may have come to try their hand at mining, they moved on to pursue other occupations all across the state. They worked as turkey farmers, cattlemen, stage drivers, railroad inspectors, trolley car men and teachers. Some of the small towns where they lived are now ghost towns—places that soared with dreams of gold and silver then faded away—Owyhee, Idaho; Unionville, Nevada; and Bodie, California.

This section of the book, originally intended to be minimal because it does not ascend from Ted's biological father, soon evolved into a colorful panorama typical of the "Wild West." The ancestral lines of Albert Sylvan Taylor's mother, those of Farneman, Moore, and Hatchett, are not merely colorful; they are both exciting and tragic. This section consists of a traditional genealogical descendancy along the Taylor line over three generations and a narrative encompassing three generations along Albert Sylvan Taylor's maternal line.

Ancestors in the Taylor paternal line—the Taylors, Meeks and Colemans—crossed the Ohio River from Maryland, Virginia and Pennsylvania in the early 1800s before Ohio became a state. The next generation migrated west as new lands opened up and better opportunities presented themselves. That story starts with Joseph Taylor, who reached Ohio when land first became available. His son Albert married the family's young housemaid and then left to fight in the Civil War. Returning after three hard years, he and his young wife went to Missouri, where they raised a small family and then left for California, finally reaching Tehama County in the 1880s. Their son Andrew Oscar Taylor, one of only three of seven children to reach adulthood, married another survivor, Emma Josephine Farneman, the third in a line of strong pioneer women, each with a story worth telling.

Emma's ancestral story starts with her grandmother Nancy, who endured a long marriage to an adventurous man who could not stay out of trouble. She followed him first to Iowa and then to Yuba and Butte counties, California, where her life ended at the hands of local Indians. Nancy's daughter Mary (Emma's mother) was married with four small children when the tragedy occurred. She and her husband, perhaps understandably, left the area soon afterwards for the silver mining region of southwestern Idaho, where she soon took up with a much older, successful farmer who had been raised in a Dunkard family, John Farneman. This ill-matched marriage soon ended in a scandalous, public divorce, after which Mary, with a new lover, headed for yet another mining boomtown, Bodie. It is within this dysfunctional family situation that Emma Farneman grew up. Emma seems to have emerged from her traumatic childhood with a determined need for order. Her father's only daughter, she used her inheritance to purchase a house for her widowed mother to live in and became a school teacher, stern in demeanor and reclusive in her later years.

Andrew Oscar Taylor and Emma Josephine Farneman, so different in many ways, but alike in that each endured a stressful, disruptive childhood, became the parents of Albert Sylvan Taylor, the hard-working, adored stepfather of Ted Judge.

## The Paternal Ancestry of Albert Sylvan Taylor

Albert's ancestry was of interest to Ted in his later years, but he knew little about it. This brief history is offered as a beginning for others to build upon. It begins with Joseph and Margaret (Meek) Taylor, Albert's great-grandparents. While Ted's biological ancestors on his father's side were largely recent immigrants from Ireland who joined the California gold rush, his stepfather's ancestors arrived on the continent much earlier. They were involved in the major early conflicts of our nation and pushed west with the earliest pioneers. While the Meek family has been traced back to early Virginia and Maryland, the Taylor side has been less thoroughly researched. [1]

The Meek family moved across the river from Brooke County in what is now West Virginia, to the newly formed Jefferson County, Ohio Territory, between 1798 and 1801. The Taylors may have come early also, but just when is difficult to determine. There were a number of pioneer Taylor families along the eastern border of what became the state of Ohio in 1803; it has not been possible at this point to sort out their records.

Joseph Taylor, according to later census enumerations, was born in Maryland 1792-96. He first appears in records with any measure of certainty in 1823, when he married Margaret Meek in Smithfield Township, Jefferson County. His presence in the 1820 census is uncertain. In 1820, a Joseph Taylor, Sr., and a Joseph Taylor, Jr., were enumerated side by side in Smithfield, but Joseph Jr., age 19-25, if the man we are looking for, appears to have had a young wife. If the correct Joseph Taylor, Margaret may have been his second wife or the female in 1820 may have been his sister. <sup>[2]</sup> Isaac Meek, written to have been Margaret's father, was enumerated in the same township. <sup>[3]</sup> The Joseph Taylor enumerated in Smithfield in 1830, age 30-39, had no young daughters as would have been expected, but that may have been an enumeration error. In 1840 he appears to be there with the expected assortment of children. <sup>[4]</sup>

Joseph Taylor land patent From Bureau of Land Management A man clearly the correct Joseph was farming in Guernsey County in 1850, where he remained until his death. This land may have been purchased long before the family relocated. In 1820 a Joseph Taylor, whether senior or junior, paid taxes on 150 acres near Zane's Trace and the National Road in Sections 2 and 9 in Oxford, Wheeling Township, Guernsey County. In 1830, a Joseph Taylor, Jr., of Jefferson County purchased land in the Ohio River Survey and United States Military Survey in Guernsey County. This land was offered for sale to veterans of the War of 1812, which suggests that if he's the correct Joseph Taylor, he was born in or before 1796. A map published by the Library of Congress in 1855 shows two large pieces of farmland marked as owned by Joseph Taylor.

Joseph is said to be buried on his farm near Millinersville. His son William and son-in-law, Alexander Cessna, co-administered his estate. His widow Margaret in 1880 was living with their youngest son, Jacob. Her death and final resting place are unknown.

## Genealogical Descendancy

**I. Joseph¹ Taylor** was born in Maryland probably between 1792 and 1796 to undetermined parents. He died on his farm in Wheeling Township, Guernsey County, Ohio, 19 December 1870.<sup>[11]</sup> Joseph married, 7 August 1823, **Margaret Meek**, born about 1802 on Short Creek near Mt. Pleasant, Jefferson County, Ohio, the daughter of Isaac Meek and his second wife Rachel Hedges.<sup>[12]</sup>

While Joseph's ancestry remains undetermined, Margaret is written to have descended from Guy Meek, from Shrewsbury, England, of Welsh ancestry, who in 1661 received a land grant in Anne Arundel County, Maryland. [13] Her descent is through his son Isaac and grandson Isaac, who was born in 1746 near Annapolis and died in Short Creek Township, in what was then Jefferson County, now Harrison County, Ohio. Statehood was around the corner, and Isaac Meek became a member of the first Legislature of Ohio in 1802.

A Joseph Taylor, not the "Col. Joseph Taylor" of Cambridge described elsewhere but likely this Joseph, receives brief treatment in Wolfe's *Stories of Guernsey County* as follows:

Joseph Taylor, from Pennsylvania, located on what afterward became the William McClelland farm, in 1817. Taylor was a Dunkard and preached occasionally. [14]

Dunkards are a conservative Old German Baptist sect, similar to the Amish in that they are pacifists and lead a comparatively non-conforming life. They originally settled in Pennsylvania, but today remain more concentrated in rural Ohio and Indiana.

The Meek family history notes fifteen children were born to Joseph and Margaret but only eleven have been confirmed from census enumerations and other sources:<sup>[15]</sup>

[18] Albert married in Guernsey County, Ohio, 20 February 1862, Mary H. Coleman. [19] Mary, the daughter of Charles Coleman and Martha Robinson, was born in Scott County, Iowa, 14 March 1841, and died at her daughter Grace's home in Red Bluff, 4 November 1917. [20]

While Albert came from a comparatively settled family of comfortable circumstances, Mary endured a stressful childhood. Her lineage extends back to before the Revolution, covered

in detail in a diary kept by her uncle, the Rev. Andrew Coleman. [21] Mary Coleman was the younger of two daughters, born a few years after the family moved from Guernsey County, Ohio, to Scott County, Iowa, along with Mary's paternal grandfather and most of her father's siblings and their families. When Mary was eight, her grandfather and an aunt to whom she was quite close died. Her father evidently was already ill with heart trouble, and when other family members decided to move on to other states, Mary's parents and sister returned to Guernsey County. Her father died there within a few years at thirty-nine. [22] Mary's mother was left destitute and went to work as a washerwoman. [23] Within a few years Mary's older sister Anna married James W. Wilson, and Mary went to work as a housemaid. [24] In the 1860 census, Mary was enumerated as a housemaid in the Taylor household, and at age nineteen, she married one of the younger Taylor sons.

Albert Taylor, son of a successful farmer, and Mary H. Coleman, housemaid in the Taylor home, were married less than eight months before Albert marched off to join the Union Army. He enlisted early, 22 August 1862, a month before Lincoln issued his preliminary Emancipation Proclamation. [25] Albert served in Company B of the 122<sup>nd</sup> Ohio Infantry, organized at Camp Zanesville in October 1862. [26] Having said goodbye to his pregnant wife, he did not return for three years.

The Civil War took Albert far from farm life. Company B engaged in continual skirmishes in Virginia and Maryland, guarded stores in Baltimore and did duty in New York City during the draft riots of March 1863. [27] Albert was listed as a prisoner of war in Winchester, Virginia 15 June 1863. [28] After his release, he returned to battle. His regiment, consisting of 1065 men, lost seven officers, eighty-six enlisted men in battle, and one hundred and thirty-seven from disease. Company B was at Appomattox during Lee's surrender. Albert was promoted to corporal 13 May 1865 and mustered out at Washington D.C. a month later. The treasured fork Albert Taylor carried during three years of combat was passed down through the family over at least three generations. [29]

Their first child died shortly after Albert returned from war. After the birth of their second child in 1866, the family removed to Missouri where one child was buried and two more children were born, including Andrew, the step-grandfather of Ted Judge. In the 1870 census in

Speedwell Township, St. Clair County, Albert was recorded as "farmer." [30] Albert and Mary with sons Joseph and Andrew, then pushed west again, this time all the way to California.

The family was enumerated on the 1880 census in West Grafton, Yolo County, where again Albert was farming.<sup>[31]</sup>

On I October 1883 Albert was awarded a homestead land entry of 158.49 acres consisting of two lots in section 2, twp. 27-N, range 4-W in Tehama County. The last Taylor child, Grace, was born the following year; one month later two of the older children died of scarlet fever. They, along with members of the family of Albert's sister Nancy Cessna, are buried in the Taylor/Cessna family plot at Oak Hill Cemetery in Red Bluff. [33]

By 1900 Albert owned a house in Red Bluff free of mortgage and was working as a school janitor. Then sixty, he may have found farming no longer physically possible. In 1891, he filed for and was awarded an invalid pension based upon his Civil War service. [35]

**3. Andrew Oscar<sup>3</sup> Taylor** (*Albert*<sup>2</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>1</sup>) was born 17 March 1871 in Missouri, the son of Albert Taylor and Mary H. Coleman. He died in Oakland, Alameda County, California, 23 August 1942. His ashes were inurned, along with those of his wife, at the Chapel of the

Chimes in Oakland. [36] On 17 July 1898, in San Francisco, Andrew married **Emma Josephine Farneman**. [37] Emma, born in California, 10 November 1875, the daughter of John Farneman and Mary E. Moore, died in San Francisco, 31 July 1966. [38]

Andrew Taylor and Emma Farneman each experienced childhoods filled with the upheavals of many pioneer moves and the deaths of siblings. Andrew was born to a father who spent three years fighting in the Civil War, then moved his family successively further west from Ohio, farming and burying children in Missouri and then California. Emma was the only child of her mother's second marriage, born into a complex family of multiple marriages and raised in the chaotic mining town of Bodie. Her ancestry and early life are covered in detail in the following chapter.

Emma was educated to become a teacher at what was then San Jose Normal School. [39] While she was teaching school in the Sierra, Andrew was exploring the world. He sailed as a cabin boy on a ship from San Francisco to Honolulu on 20 March 1896 and returned 5 May. [40] Somewhere they met and then married in 1898 in San Francisco. [41] Their marriage was announced in the *Evening News*: "Miss Emma Farneman of San Jose and Andrew Taylor of Red Bluff were married in San Francisco on July 17<sup>th</sup>."

Andrew worked for a year as a railway conductor in San Francisco and then headed for the Sierra Nevada and a job with the Southern Pacific Railroad. [42] Following the birth of their son Albert in August 1899, mother and son joined him, and they lived with his brother Joseph. Both men worked for the railroad, Andrew as a car inspector and Joseph as a car repairman. [43] Emma was enumerated twice in the 1900 census, in both Washoe County, Nevada, and in San Jose, where she was living with her mother, Mary E. (Moore) (Dikeman) (Farneman) Baker in the house Emma purchased with money inherited from her father. [44]

For several years, Emma and Andrew split their time between the mountains and the Bay Area. In 1903 they moved to San Jose, where Emma's mother, Mary, was already ill and where she died a year later. There were legal decisions to be made; Emma was appointed administratrix. [45] In 1904 Andrew received a certificate of service from Southern Pacific in

San Jose as a car inspector. In 1905 in San Jose he was working as a driver for Kelley Laundry and in 1906, immediately following the earthquake, he was one of the few who were authorized to enter secure areas in the rubble of San Jose. [46]

Daughter Maryemma was born in 1907 in Santa Clara, but by 1910 the family had returned to the mountains. The family lived in Alpine County, where Emma taught and worked as an enumerator in the 1910 census, then later moved to Nevada. In the 1910 census of Markleeville, Alpine County, and in the 1920 and 1930 censuses of Mottsville and Centerville, Douglas County, Nevada, Andrew's occupation was recorded as "farmer." [47] In 1929, in Nevada, their son Albert married Hazel Agnes (Roussel) Judge, a divorcee

with a young son, Ted Judge, and their daughter Maryemma married the district attorney of Lincoln County, Nevada, Julian Thruston. Andrew and Emma saw Maryemma bury her firstborn child in 1936 and bear a second in 1937, after which the Taylors returned to the Bay Area, where Andrew died in 1942.

Albert Sylvan<sup>4</sup> Taylor** (*Andrew*<sup>3</sup>, *Albert*<sup>2</sup>, *Joseph*<sup>1</sup>) was born 16 August 1899 in San Francisco, and died 9 September 1995 in Saratoga, Santa Clara County. He married in Oakland, at the Chinese Methodist Church, 11 May 1929, as her second husband, his close friend of a number of years, **Hazel Agnes Roussel**. [51] Agnes was born 5 January 1900 in Karlo, Lassen

County, and died 12 December 1988 in Santa Clara County. [52] Her ancestry and life before her second marriage are covered in the chapter titled "Descendants of Eleanora (Bush) Harman Foley Woods Holmes."

Albert registered for the World War I draft from Nevada. His registration card describes

him as a tall, slender man with blue eyes and dark brown hair. [53] According to the 1930 census, however, he was never called to serve. [54] A staunch union man, he was a longtime conductor for the East Bay Transit Company and was granted lifetime privileges by his local union after paying his dues for fifty years. Albert and Agnes and her son Ted lived for many years in the Montclair District of Oakland. While they did not have any children together, Albert was the father that Ted acknowledged throughout life.

Albert's parents, Andrew and Emma, lived near the family for a number of years preceding Andrew's death in 1942, after which Emma moved to San Francisco. Emma, at that point quite reclusive, still allowed Agnes, a nurse by training and a tiny, fiercely private woman, to look in on her.

In their final years after his retirement, Al and Agnes lived in Sunnyvale, Santa Clara County. Albert was known as a kind man and extraordinary gardener. "His gladiolas stood right up." [55] Agnes's son Ted, who spent his own retirement years as a private investor, evidently shared these skills with his stepfather, for on Albert's 1995 death certificate under employment is entered, "private investor." [56]



# The Matrilineal Ancestry of Albert Sylvan Taylor: Three Generations of Adversity and Adventure in the Early Far West

Just as Albert Sylvan Taylor was "Dad" to Ted Judge, Albert's mother Emma was the only "Grandma" Ted came to know. As described in the previous chapter, Emma was a very organized woman, a school teacher for many years in both urban and rural California; relatives discovered upon her death that she had been an avid collector of stamps. It is Emma's maternal ancestry that unfolded a colorful and at times tragic story of pioneer women that encompassed three generations of adversity and adventure in small towns we no longer hear much about.

The lineage of this matrilineal trail is shown graphically on the facing page. The story begins with Nancy Hatchett, who began life as the daughter of a slave-owning Virginia family in the late 1700s, married a man who seemed unable to stay out of trouble and ended her life tragically as a widowed grandmother on a turkey farm in Butte County, California, killed by Indians. Her daughter, Mary Moore, lived a wild existence in various mining towns that are no more. Finally, Mary's daughter Emma, perhaps shaped by her unsettled childhood, became a stern, orderly school teacher. This story is worth telling here, just as it may have been told to Ted.

## The Tragic Life of Nancy Hatchett

Nancy Hatchett was the daughter of Edward Hatchett and Mary Newsteys Blagrove, born about 1797 near Chatham, Pittsylvania County, Virginia, a part of Virginia that later became the state of West Virginia. Little is known of her childhood until, when about fifteen years old, she married Vincent Moore of the same county, son of slave owner Thomas Moore and his wife, Nancy Ann Whaley. The first actual record we have of Nancy and Vincent is the marriage bond paid by Edward Hatchett, 12 January 1812. [1] Moore family researchers say Vincent and Nancy had their first two sons in Pittsylvania County, William Moore in 1816 and Thomas Jefferson Moore, 12 August 1817. William must have died in infancy because Vincent had no children when on 23 May 1816 his father, Thomas Moore, signed his will. [2] "My son Vincent to hold and enjoy the place where he now lives and to include 100 acres,

to have my negro Nelson. Should Vincent die without issue, the property to revert to the family." [3]

Vincent Moore's father died 27 August 1816, naming in his will his wife and his eleven children, among whom he divided land, livestock, personal effects and twelve slaves: Lucy, Cate, Nance of Ephraim, Patty, Juno, Kason, Peter, Nelson, Simon, Gabriel, French, and Anthony. Vincent received Nelson. [4]

Shortly afterwards, Vincent and Nancy removed to Pike County, Missouri, where in 1818, Vincent bought 160 acres of land. The 1820 U.S. Census for Missouri Territory no longer exists, but in 1830 a string of Moore families lived close together, Vincent among them, enumerated with a wife, five children and one slave. On 1 April 1838 Vincent Moore families County purchased at the Palmyra land office two 40-acre parcels in Sections 17 and 23, Twp. 51N, Range 6W, both near the West Fork of the Cuivre River, an area now in Audrain County, Missouri.

Many members of the Moore family were Baptists. Vincent's sister Penelope married a Baptist minister, the Rev. Willis Hopwood. His brother Merrimon Moore became a minister, and in 1834 his brother James Moore set aside an acre of his land in Pike County for the erection of the Siloam Baptist church. James and another brother, Levi Moore (who had married sisters Elizabeth and Nancy Shellhorse, respectively) were active members in Siloam until a schism within the congregation led to their shifting in 1851 to the new Indian Creek Baptist Church. [8] No records were found pertaining to Vincent's church membership, if he had any.

Vincent appears to have been the proverbial black sheep in his family. From 1838 through 1840, four complaints were filed in Audrain County Circuit Court involving Vincent Moore and his family. In November of 1838 Vincent was arrested and charged with betting at "three up," an illegal game of some type. Other men charged with him were ordered to pay \$100 each to the court or give evidence against him, which they did. The case was continued to 1839, during which Vincent spent part of the time in jail. Also in 1838 Vincent was charged with stealing a heifer from Greenberry Johnson. [9] In March of 1840 Vincent was charged with grand larceny for stealing a cow. The case was continued for more than a year, and the trial was eventually assigned to Boone County after Vincent's lawyer argued, and the court agreed, that Vincent could not get a fair trial in Audrain County. The sheriff took Vincent from the Audrain County jail to Boone County, where a jury was unable to agree on the charges and they were dismissed.

At some point during this legal wrangling, men may have come to Vincent Moore's farm and assaulted his wife, Nancy. It is also possible that he was unconscionably litigious. He filed suit against William Still, Andrew Still, Spencer Daviss, John Daviss and Francis Wisdom, for \$1,000 in damages for assault and battery of Mrs. Nancy Moore and larceny of plaintiff's property. Vincent lost the case and had to pay costs. Thomas J. Moore, presumably Vincent's eldest son, also filed suit in 1840 against William Still, but for trespass. He, too, lost and had to pay court costs.

In 1840 the Vincent Moore household was enumerated in Cuivre Township, Audrain County; their seventh child, Mary, who will be of primary interest here, was then about two or possibly three. [10] By 1844 the family was on the move. Vincent and Nancy sold forty acres to Thomas Jefferson Moore for \$60 and moved on to Iowa. By 1850, Vincent was gone, while Nancy and four of their children were in Muscatine Township, Muscatine County, Iowa. [11]

According to family stories, Vincent had left his wife and four children about 1849 and gone "round the Horn" to California. However, evidence suggests he may not have gone "round the Horn" but traveled overland, perhaps with former Pike County neighbor Walter Crow, instead. Walter went to California from Missouri in 1849 and, seeing the need for livestock to "feed the miners," returned to form a cattle drive, in which a number of Moore family members participated. Vincent Moore's oldest son Thomas, like his father, left a wife and children in Iowa to go to California. He arrived in Grass Valley in October of 1849, spent time in Nevada City and "Rabbit Creek" (now LaPorte) and mined with his brother Edward. Thomas then returned to Iowa in 1850 to collect his family, but was back in Butte County by 1856, when his second to youngest son was born. Vincent's son William also went west in 1849, perhaps with Vincent. When William died in 1921, his obituary, published in the *San Jose Mercury News*, 20 May 1921, reads, "...born in Missouri, March 8, 1826. He crossed the plains...arriving in California in 1849..." and then goes on to recount some events he shared with his father along the way.

Vincent may have returned to Iowa to collect his wife and younger children, or they may have traveled west with others to join him, probably in 1851-52. Whenever they came, Nancy and the rest of their children were settled in California by 1860, near Marysville in Yuba County.<sup>[13]</sup>

Leaving the Midwest was likely a good idea for Vincent. He had been in and out of trouble there and perhaps saw California as a place to reinvent himself. Moore researchers report that Vincent died in the early 1850s, but this evidently was not the case. He was enumerated on the 1860 census near Marysville with Nancy and their youngest son, Napoleon, and close to their son William and daughter Nancy Cavin. Vincent was listed as a farmer with \$1,000 personal property. [14] Vincent and Nancy's daughter Mary, at this point married only a few years, was living in Lassen Township, Tehama County, with her first husband, Joseph Dike-



man.<sup>[15]</sup> Vincent must have died between 1860 and 1865, but no death or burial record has been found.

Eighteen sixty-five proved a fateful year for the surviving Moore family. The widowed Nancy and son William were living on a farm on Mud Creek, not far north of Chico, where they raised turkeys. Periodic depredations by the Mill Creek Indians were common and often ended tragically. One day in April, William rode out to buy a load of shake bolts to build turkey crates. When he returned later that day, he reportedly discovered his mother's body near the empty turkey pens. There are two versions of her death, the first perhaps considerably more embellished than the second:

... His trip was uneventful and he returned as soon as he procured his load of shake bolts. A short distance from home, he heard the report of a gun. Since he was unarmed, he left his team tied to a sapling and cautiously crept forward to investigate. He heard the shouts of Indians as they proceeded up the canyon, away from the cabin. He unhitched one of the horses from his heavily laden wagon, and rode it to a neighboring farm house for help. They were so frightened by his story they refused to return with him, stating that if the men left, there would be no protection for their womenfolk, which was true.

So he went back to his home alone. He entered the cabin and called for his mother, but there was no answer. As he left the cabin, he looked up the small hill toward the turkey pens, which were somewhat concealed by low bushes. Imagine his shock, when he saw the body of his mother on the ground near the bushes. A hasty investigation disclosed that she had been shot through the back. He carried her into the cabin and placed her on the bed, then he brought the team and wagon to the barn. The wagon had to be unloaded before he could use it to transport her body for burial.

He drove the wagon to Joseph and Mary E. (Vannoy) [sic] Dikeman's place which was on the old stage road. These people were distant relatives; Mary E. (Vannoy)[sic] Dikeman was the sister of Frances Matilda (Vannoy) Moore, and Frances Matilda was the wife of Thomas Jefferson Moore Sr. [16] They washed his mother, dressed her and prepared her body for burial as best they could. That night, the Indians returned to the Moore's ranch, stole the turkeys and burned down all the buildings.

The next day the family drove to the ranch of Nancy's son, Thomas Jefferson Moore Sr., near Nord (but nearer to the Plez Quinn place). From there an undertaker by the name of Breece from Chico was summoned and he took charge of the arrangements. She was buried in the Chico Cemetery under the spreading branches of a large oak tree. A few years earlier, its branches threw shadows across the newly dug graves of the three Hickock children who were also massacred by roving Indians. At present (1979) the location of her grave is unknown. Earlier, May Belle (Moore) Rice stated that she had seen a wooden grave-marker at one time marking Nancy's grave, but that it was rotting away. She also stated that the grave was near Dan Bidwell's plot on the southwest corner of the cemetery. [17]

A second version, considerably shorter, written near the time of the event by an early Californian named Sim Moak states:

On the thirteenth of April, 1865, a band of this same tribe descended on the Moore home on Mud Creek, which they robbed of over a thousand dollars, after having killed old Grandma Moore. Before leaving they set the house on fire and burned the body of Mrs. Moore up in her own home. [18]

William's obituary in 1921 affirms the story: "His mother was killed by the Indians near Chico, Butte County, in the early fifties." [19]

#### The Many-Husbanded Life of Mary Moore Dikeman Farneman Baker

Mary E. Moore, daughter of Vincent and Nancy Hatchett Moore, was the fifth of nine children. Born in Boonesborough, Moniteau County, Missouri, 24 June 1837, she died as Mary Baker in San Jose, Santa Clara County, California, 4 January 1904, following a tumultuous life that could be fodder for a television series.<sup>[20]</sup>

Still young when her father left Missouri for California, Mary remained behind in Iowa with her mother, Nancy, and younger siblings before coming west. In Butte County, California, 20 May 1856, Mary married Joseph Dikeman, a carpenter, born in Pennsylvania about 1828. Over the next eight years they had four children: Benjamin Franklin in 1857, William O. in 1859, George Washington about 1862 and Minnie about 1864. [22]

Joseph Dikeman, like the Moores, settled along Mud Creek on the northern portion of Cohasset Ridge, straddling the Butte-Tehama County border. [23] In February 1865, some ten years later when the land first became available for purchase from the government, Joseph Dikeman made a cash entry. [24] Raids by local Indians posed an ongoing problem, however, and two months later, in April 1865, Mary's mother Nancy was murdered. About this time, the wagon road from Chico to the silver mining area in western Idaho Territory was completed as far as the Jordan Valley, which stretches along the Jordan River in today's Malheur County, Oregon, into Owyhee County, Idaho. [25] Many families headed east, either to mine

or to provide supplies to the miners. Following the murder of her mother, Mary's fears for the safety of her own family can only be imagined. She was twenty-eight and had four children under age eight; the Dikemans, or at least Mary, evidently joined the exodus.

Several of Mary (Moore) Dikeman's siblings moved away in the years following their mother's murder. By 1868 her brother William was running a cattle business and a stage stop in Oriana, Humboldt (now Pershing) County, Nevada. [26] Humboldt County also became the new home of her brother Napoleon and her sister Nancy (Moore) Cavin, who had lived near their mother in 1860. [27] Vincent Moore, Jr., who registered to vote in Butte County, California in 1868, is noted in the Butte Great Register of Voters as having "left the state." [28] Joseph Dikeman appears to have become part of Mary's trail of former husbands soon afterwards; the circumstances are not clear. In 1870, Mary was in the Jordan Valley with a new husband, John Farneman. [29] Joseph Dikeman was not found living in the Jordan Valley, although a John Dikeman is mentioned in Mary's depredation claim (see following).

John Farneman, Mary's second husband, spent at least ten years in the gold fields of California before going to Idaho. He mined in 1850 in Trinity County and in 1860 in LaPorte, Sierra County. [30] Born about 1827 in Ohio, he was the son of Dunkards, a pacifist sect whose members lived simply, spoke German and farmed diligently. [31] No records have been found,

however, to show that he continued in this faith. He left the Sierras for Idaho Territory with the first rush toward the new mines there, not to mine but to farm, at which, judging from numerous newspaper articles in the *Owyhee Avalanche*, he was quite successful.

Even in Idaho, harassment by local Indian tribes continued. In 1903, Mary submitted a depredation claim to the government to recover \$8,200 for losses incurred of hay and livestock stolen by the Paiute Indians in November of 1866, March of 1867 and September of 1868. Only the 1868 claim was honored because the U.S. government had not yet completed a treaty with the tribe during the first two years. Mary had to settle for \$3,075. [32] Her deposition provides insight into the harsh conditions the settlers endured. It remains unclear whether Joseph Dikeman may have been the John Dikeman mentioned in the claim or whether he ever made it to the Jordan Valley.

Mary E. Farneman (June 13, 1903). Age, 60 years. I reside in San Jose, California. In September, 1868, I was living in Jordan Valley, Owyhee County, Idaho. I am the claimant. I owned horses and cattle while living there: 25 head of horses and 24 head of work oxen. The Piute Indians made a raid through Jordan Valley, drove off the cattle and horses, and shot the cattle with poisoned arrows. The people residing there at the time were there, but the Indians stole the cattle and horses at night. I saw the Indians driving them off. They took all of the 25 horses and 24 head of oxen. The settlers tried to prevent the Indians from taking the stock, but they were overpowered by the Indians. I was acquainted with the value of horses and cattle in that locality at that time; these horses were worth \$100 each, and the oxen \$50 a head. These horses and cattle belonged to myself and my husband, and were community property.

I was born in the State of Missouri and never lived outside the United States. I was married in 1856. My husband is dead; he died in 1892. I was living with my husband in 1868. He was engaged in hauling supplies for the Government. The testimony offered now is in support of the loss of 1868 only.

My husband was hauling hay and grain for the Government and used these horses and cattle for this purpose. He bought the horses at different places; some in California and some in Idaho. There was no one associated with my husband in this hauling, and he had no partner. My husband was born at Delphi, Indiana, and he never resided outside the United States. John Brady and James Batchelor lost property at the same time my husband lost his. Brady is dead, and Batchelor lives in Jordan Valley. Batchelor lost horses and cattle. They burned up a blacksmith shop for Brady. A man by the name of John Dikeman lost 10 yoke of cattle. He is dead. Bill Beachy lost all he had; he ran a stage. The Indians drove the horses off to their reservations, and the cattle they killed with poisoned arrows. My husband did not recover any of his horses, nor did he receive any indemnity for his loss. I know the date of this loss because every year when the Indians would make a raid—1866, 1867, 1868—I wrote it down. I had money of my own invested in these horses and cattle apart from my husband's property and money. My husband paid differ-

ent prices for these horses; some from \$75 to \$100; most of them \$100. He did all the buying of the horses and also of the cattle. He paid \$50 a head for the cattle. I was present when these horses and cattle were taken, and I saw the Indians take them. They drove them in a northwest direction. Fifteen hundred dollars of my money was invested in this stock. I claim the right of indemnity to the entire loss of 1868 by reason of being the widow of John Farneman, and his only heir, and also in my own behalf.

Depositions submitted by other witnesses in support of this claim included those from her brother William, then of Evergreen, Santa Clara County, California, and also Amos Springer, the former sheriff of Owyhee County, who deposed that John Farneman had a sizeable ranch, was running a stage(coach) station and hotel on the route along the Jordan Valley between Silver City and Three Forks Camp and also had a dairy business.

While Mary claimed and her deponents attested that John Farneman was her husband at the time, it seems she did not marry him until 17 April 1870. [33] Mary did not have all four Dikeman children with her in 1870, only Minnie. Inasmuch as the Farneman marriage was announced in Sacramento, it seems likely that at least two, and possibly three of her children had been left behind near Chico with relatives. Indeed, on 15 August 1870, the *Owyhee Avalanche* newspaper ran: "Mr. & Mrs. Farnaman were in town last Sunday. Mrs. Farnaman left for California for the purpose of bringing her sons to Idaho." It is not clear if her eldest child, Benjamin Franklin Moore, ever came to Idaho. He made his way to where his Moore uncles and aunt lived in Unionville, Humboldt (now Pershing) County, Nevada, where he died 19 May 1872 at age fifteen. [34]

John Farneman apparently also maintained a residence in San Francisco, where he may have spent the winter months. The *Owyhee Avalanche* issue of 4 October 1875 implies as much: "H.S. Chasbro and John Farneman of San Francisco are in town." John and Mary Farneman's only child, Emma, was born in California, in November of 1875, but the family was back in Idaho again several months later. We learn then that John's interests extended beyond farming to mining. The 12 February 1876 issue of the *Owyhee Avalanche* named John Farneman an investor in the "War Eagle Mining Company, Location principal place of business, San Francisco, California. Location of the Works, Owyhee County, Idaho Territory...."

Despite John's worldly success, his marriage to Mary deteriorated amid very public accusations. John didn't just file for divorce, he took out a summons for divorce in large print in the 22 March 1879 *Idaho Statesman* newspaper, accusing Mary of having committed adultery with Joseph Baker and citing numerous specific times and places—February through July of 1878 in Atlanta Hill, Alturas, Idaho; July 1879 at Kelton, Utah, "and since that time living in adulterous intercourse with said Joseph Baker." [35] Mary responded, also in the *Statesman*: "The statement of John Farneman, published in the Statesman, that I lived in adultery with Joseph Baker is a falsehood or a lie. I was granted a divorce two months before his summons appeared in the paper. Mary Farneman." [36] The divorce was heard 6 June 1879 in Rocky Bar, Alturas County, Idaho; perhaps there was an earlier divorce in Utah, perhaps

not.<sup>[37]</sup> A month later John married his second wife, Mary Dunster of Oakland, California, a marriage that ended with her death in 1890, and took yet a third wife shortly before he died.<sup>[38]</sup> A marriage record for Mary and Joseph Baker was not found, although Mary used the name Baker for the better part of the rest of her life, with the exception of the depredation claim filed in 1903.

At the very time Mary's marriage to John Farneman dissolved, a new mining town, Bodie, California, boomed. The government established a land office there in January 1879. By July the newspapers were bragging that Bodie had seven barbershops and an opera house. Hopeful miners streamed into Bodie by wagon, stage, on horseback or on foot, among them, Joseph and Mary E. Baker. By the first week in May, Mary and Joseph Baker were already selling property they had previously purchased. [39] Joseph, Mary, Mary's three Dikeman children and her Farneman daughter, Emma, all using the name Baker, were enumerated in Bodie in June of 1880. [40] They were still there in 1881, when Joseph Baker paid taxes on the land, his house and household goods, but probably left before 1890, when the population had dropped from a high of over 5,000 to only several hundred. [41]

Like all mining towns, Bodie was a wild, dangerous place and hardly a town in which to raise small children. One newspaper in 1881 reported that the town was becoming a resort since there had been no killings in the preceding week. The mines, however, yielded their gold quickly and residents moved on to more promising areas. In 1892 a fire destroyed most of what remained.

About this time, John's Farneman's death was reported in the *Idaho Statesman Mountain Home Bulletin*, 24 Nov 1892:

The Bulletin is pained to learn of the death of John Farneman at Atlanta, which occurred on the 14th inst. Dr. Loring of this place was called to Atlanta a few hours after his arrival there on Monday. Mr. Farneman was an old resident of Atlanta and was highly esteemed by all. He leaves a widow—having been married only a few weeks ago to Mrs. Perry—and a daughter in California.

Nothing more has been learned of Joseph Baker. Mary Baker died 4 January 1904 in San Jose, where she had lived for over ten years in a house purchased by her daughter Emma with money inherited from Emma's father, John Farneman. She was interred in Oak Hill Cemetery in San Jose. [42] Mary's death was reported in a short article appearing in the *San Jose Mercury News*, 6 January 1904:

Mrs. Baker Dies: Mrs. Mary E. Baker died at her home in this city on Monday at the age of 66 years. She was a native of Missouri, and is survived by a number of children who reside in this vicinity.

Her death notice in the other San Jose paper, the *Evening News*, published the same day, provided names of her surviving children: Mrs. A. O. Taylor, Mrs. M. F. Benjamin, and George and William Dikeman.<sup>[43]</sup>

Shortly before she died, Mary, under the name of Farneman, filed a depredation claim for some of the losses incurred in Indian raids while living in Idaho, as described above. She died before receiving any remuneration. When the money was received from the government several years later, it was necessary for her daughter Emma, who had been administratrix of her mother's estate, to petition to reopen probate in order to pay taxes on the money received.[44] The original probate file has been lost, and it was only because probate had to be reopened that many of the colorful details of this many-husbanded woman have come to light. The depositions in the claim raise a number of interesting questions. Mary filed the claim under the name of Farneman. Did she never really marry Joseph Baker? The events she filed for took place, moreover, while she was still Mary E. Dikeman. Under

oath when asked when she married, she answered 1856, the year of her Dikeman marriage. We are left to wonder.

# Emma Farneman Taylor: Coming of Age—from a Chaotic Childhood in Mining Camps to the Orderly Life of a Schoolteacher

Emma Josephine Farneman, daughter of Mary E. Moore Dikeman Farneman and her second husband, John Farneman, was born 10 November 1875, in California, possibly in San Fran-

cisco, when her parents were away from their ranch in the Jordan Valley, Owyhee County, Idaho. She died in San Francisco, 31 July 1966. [45]

When Emma was four, her parents underwent a scandalous public divorce, after which her mother ran off with her children and a new man to Bodie. The many chaotic years she spent as a child, mostly in lawless Bodie in what may have been a rather dysfunctional family with a possibly less than stable mother, must have come to play in the type of woman Emma

was determined to become and indeed became: focused, strict and orderly. Her father's money allowed her to do this. It seems that John Farneman, still living in Idaho but perhaps moving back and forth between there and his interests in San Francisco, kept in touch with his only child, Emma, as Emma moved from Idaho to boomtown Bodie and then as a young woman to San Jose. In 1892, he left his estate, which must have been sizable, to be divided between Emma and his new wife of only two months, Mrs. Eleanor A. Perry. [46]

With the money inherited from her father, young Emma Farneman bought her mother a house at 374 East St. John in San Jose, Santa Clara County, California, and lived there as she pursued a teaching credential from the San Jose Normal School. [47] Emma graduated in 1894 and in 1896 was hired to teach school in Bridgeport in Mono County. [48] The local paper, the *Bridgeport Chronicle Union*, on 11 July 1896, reported:

Miss Emma Farneman has been engaged to teach the Mono Lake School. Miss Farneman was formerly of Bodie, being better known there by the old timers when a little girl when [sic] Emma Baker she since having taken the name of her stepfather.

In San Francisco, 17 July 1898, Emma married Andrew O. Taylor, who was described as of Red Bluff at the time of their marriage, but in 1899 was listed in the San Francisco city directory as a conductor on the Market Street Railway. [49]

Andrew continued his work as a railway conductor for a year and then headed for the Sierra Nevada and a job with the Southern Pacific Railroad. [50] Following the birth of their son Albert in 1899, mother and son joined him, and they lived with his brother Joseph; both men

worked for the railroad, Andrew as a car inspector and Joseph as a car repairman. [51] Emma, even after marrying, spent time in San Jose with her mother and was doubly counted in the 1900 census—once with her husband in Wadsworth Precinct, Washoe County, Nevada, and once with her mother in San Jose. [52]

In 1903 they moved to San Jose in order to be with Emma's mother, who died in January 1904. Emma served as executrix of her mother's estate, as discussed previously, and they lived there through the 1906 earthquake and a few years afterwards. In 1904 Andrew received a certificate of service from Southern Pacific in San Jose as a railroad car inspector, and in 1905 in San Jose he worked as a driver for Kelley Laundry. Daughter Maryemma was born there in 1907, but by 1910, the family had returned to the mountains. They lived in Alpine County, while Emma taught in schools there, and it was there also that she served as an enumerator in the 1910 census. In 1920 and 1930 in Mottsville and Centerville, respectively, Douglas

County, Nevada, Emma worked off and on as a school teacher. Husband Andrew's occupation in the census was always recorded as "farmer." [53]

Emma's younger relatives recall being terrified of her stern countenance, which perhaps only reflected her fierce determination to succeed in life.<sup>[54]</sup> Her brief biography, which appeared in a San Jose State Teacher's College history reads:<sup>[55]</sup>

Emma J. Farneman (Mrs. Andrew O. Taylor) ... Gardnerville, Nevada; taught in Mono County; married in 1898; lived in San Francisco for a time, then San Jose; has taught in Alpine County since her marriage; removed to Gardnerville, Nevada; has two children.

Following the marriages of their children, the Taylors returned to the San Francisco Bay Area to be near their son Albert, his wife Agnes and Agnes's son, Ted Judge. Andrew died in Oakland in 1942. [56] Emma became quite reclusive and died in San Francisco in 1966. During these years and perhaps before, Emma amassed a large and valuable stamp collection. Following her death it was appraised at \$10,000, yet more evidence of a precise, orderly existence, fashioned by a chaotic childhood little known to those about her.

#### Mary E. Farneman v. The United States and Piute [sic] Indians

In 1893, Mary E. Moore Dikeman Farneman Baker, under the name Mary E. Farneman, filed a depredation claim with the government to recover losses in real estate, personal property and livestock suffered in raids by Paiute Indians in the Jordan Valley, Idaho, over the years 1866-1868. Because the United States did not have a standing treaty with the Paiute Tribe during 1866-67, only the 1868 claim was allowed.

The following pages were selected from that voluminous claim, copied at the National Achives in Washington, D.C., by Holly Baker. Note that Mary presented herself as Mary Farneman, although she may in fact have been Mary Baker at the time of filing and Mary Dikeman at the time of the loss. She died in 1904 before the claim could be ruled upon. Her daughter, Emma J. Farneman Taylor, who was the administratrix of Mary's estate, filed to reopen the claim in 1906.

On 30 June 1906 the estate of Mary E. Farneman received \$2,610 in settlement.

This appendix contains copies of four separate documents. It begins with Mary E. Farneman's petition, followed by the depositions of Mary, Nancy Jones and William Moore, then the deposition of Amos C. Springer, the Sheriff of Owyhee Co., Idaho. The findings and conclusion are at the end.

G. Palmer, U. S. Special Attorney.

Amos C. Springer, being duly sworn as a witness, testifies as follows:-

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY CHARLES. A. SHURTLEFF.

- Q. State your name, age, residence and present occupation?
- A. Amos C. Springer, 64 years of age, Boise City, Idaho, mining.
- Q. Rinxxxx Where were you residing in the year 1868?
- A. Owyhee, Idaho Territory.
- Q. Were you acquainted with Mary E. Farneman and her husband John Farneman, at that time?
- A. I was.
- Q. How long had you been acquainted with them at that time?
- A. I had been acquainted with Mr. Farneman since 1864, and with Mrs. Farneman since the latter part or '67.
- Q. How near did you reside to them in the year 1868?
- A. Twenty miles.

- Q. What was your occupation in the year 1868?
- A. I was Sheriff of Owyhee County.
- Q. In what business was Mr. and Mrs. Farneman engaged in at that time?
- A. They were ranching, and kept an eating station on the road between Silver City and the Government Fort of Camp Three Forks, Owyhee County. He also hauled a great deal of stuff to the Fort, particularly hay; he was one of the most thrifty farmers there, and used to sell the Fort from 100 to 125 tons of hay a year, and I have bought as high as 125 and 130 tons a year from him.
- Q. Were you at his ranch during any time in the year 1868?
- A. I was, frequently.
- Q. What, if anything, do you know as to whether claimants had any horses or cattle on their ranch in 1868?
- A. They did. They had a large amount of stock, cattle he had about three or four hundred head, I mean in 1868; all told, brute and mares, anywhere from 75 to 100 head.
- Q. What, if anything, do you know of claimants losing any of their horses or cattle in the year 1868?
- A. The Indians raided him in '68 and took both horses and cattle.
- Q. Do you know the month of 1868 that this occurred?
- A. In the Fall, I don't know exactly the month, but I know it was late in the season because we did not cut hay in that County until about July, and didn't get it stacked until August, and at the time of the raid a hay stack was burned up. It was about the first of October.
- Q. Do you know how many horses he lost?
- A. I don't know the number, but I know that he lost a pretty good bunch, for I had a talk with him and he said: (defendant objects to witness stating this conversation, as hearsay)

- Q. Do you know how many head of cattle he lost this time?
- A. I don't know just how many, they drove will them off in a band.

- A. We were talking about the Indian raid, and I asked him how many they got away from him at that time; his reply was that he hadn't rounded his cattle up, but they hit him hard. They took quite a band of his horses some very good ones.
- Q. Were you well acquainted with his cattle and horses at that time?
- A. I was.
- Q. Did you miss any mi known cattle or horses, from his possession, after this raid?
- A. I missed the horses. I didn't pay any attention to the cattle, as I did not deal with him in cattle, but I dealt largely with korses him in horses. I missed some good work horses that I was there to purchase from him at this time.

  Of those that were gone, there was four that I wanted. As to what others went I couldn't say, only from what he told me.
- Q. Do you know the value of horses and cattle such as were owned by Mr. Farneman at the time and place of this grand. raid?
- A. Yes.

Planty

- Q. Please state those values?
- A. He had all classes of stock, from cheap saddle horses to work horses that were worth \$200 a piece. He paid me \$200 for a black mare that was gone, which I had sold him

just a short time before the raid. Saddle horses were &. worth about \$80, and his buggy and work horses would range from \$125 to \$200 per head.

- Q. Do you know what his cattle were worth?
- A. The work oxen that were taken away from there were worth from \$150 to \$200 a yoke, and beef cattle about \$35 a head.
- Q. Do you recollect what price you would have been willing to pay for the four horses whichyou say you intended to purchase of him?
- A. They were worth \$400 a pair .
- Q. How long after this raid was it that you were at Mr. Farneman's ranch?
- A. About two weeks.
- Q. You were not there at the time of the raid?

  A. No, sir.
- Q. Do you know what Indians committed this raid?
- AX (objected to as incompetent for the reason that it has not been established that the witness had any personal knowledge as to who committed the raid, or as to a raid having been committed defendant excepts)
- A. I am not positive what Indians were, but always considered that it was Winnemucca's band, the Piutes.
- Q. When you were there at Mr. Farneman's ranch, what signs, if any, did you see that indicated that there had been a raid?
- A. The burning of hay-stacks; three hay-stacks were burned. And the horses being gone, that I was after. There were plenty of bullet holes in the gable end of the house. Plenty of moccasin tracks about the barn and yard wax where they corralled the stock generally. There had apparently been no stock around there after the raid, and I could see the movcasin tracks in the dust and the manure. I saw old Bigfoot's tracks there plainly, and everybody there knew his

tracks. He was a Piute and belonged to Winnemucca's band.

- Q. How late did xxxxxxxxxx the rains begin?
- A. Generally the rains don't commence until late in November.
- Q. Have you any interest in this claim, or are you related in any way to the claimant?
- A. I have not, and am not.
- Q. Do you know whether Mr. Farneman was a citizen of the United States?

(objected to as incompetent, and not the best evidence - defendant excepts)

- A. He always had the election precinct at his ranch, he was one of the judges, and County Commissioner, always voted, and was one of the solid man of our County.
- Q. Did you ever know of Mr. Farneman ever giving any of the Indians in theat vicinity or country any provocation which would tend to provoke a raid upon him or his property?
- A. None whatever.
- Q. Was there an Indian reservation in Owyhee County in 1868?
- A. There was not.

CROSS-EXAMINATION BY W. G. PALMER.2

- Query You are not sure but what the time when you went to Mr. Farneman's ranch to buy these horses in the Fall of 1868 was in September, or October, are you?
- A. Not exactly positive, but I am satisfied it was about the first of October.
- Q. Did you miss any of his work oxen at this time?
- A. No. He was hauling hay up to my place that Fall, and to Silver City; he generally sent five teams on a trip, ten oxen to the team, and I know that he was crippled out ax of a team or two at the time of that loss.

- Q. You did not have any personal knowledge of this raid at this time, did you?
- A. I did not, only what Mr. Farneman and his neighbors told me, but it was a well known fact that this raid was made, though. (Defendant moves to strike out what witness says as to it being a well known fact that this raid was made, as voluntary, not responsive and as a conclusion of law defendants except)
- Q. The first you knew of this raid was what Mr. Farneman told you, was it not?
- A. No, I think I heard of it a few days after it was reported in town.
- Q/ You did not see this raid made, or see any Indians at this time, did you?
- A. I did not.
- Q. You spoke about seeing moccasin tracks about Mr. Farneman's premises; it was not unusual to see moccasin tracks any where in that vicinity during the year 1868 even when there was no raid made, was it?
- A. It was not unusual.

RE-DIRECT EXAMINATION BY CHARLES A. SHURTLEFF.

- Q. Can you state positively whether the time when you were at the ranch of Mr. Farneman, and missed the four horses and other stock from Mr. Farneman's ranch, was before or after you heard of this raid in 1868?
- A. Yes, sir, afterwards.

Court of Claims. (INDIAN DEPREDATION NO. 9950) Mary E. Farneman THE UNITED STATES and the INDIANS. This case having been heard by the Court of Claims, the court, upon the evidence, makes the following FINDINGS OF FACT. At the time of the depredation , hereinafter stated, the claimant was a citizen of the United States. September, 1868, in Owyhee County, Odaho. Indians belonging to the Linte tribe of Judians kind and character described in the petition, the property of claimant , which was reasonably worth the sum of \$26/0 . Said property was taken, as aforesaid, without just cause or provocation on the part of the owner or the agent in charge, and has never been returned or paid for. At the time of said depredation the defendant Indians were in amity with the United States. at the time of the alleged depredations in 1866 and 1867, the defendant Indians were not in anity with the united States. CONCLUSION OF LAW. Upon the foregoing Findings of Fact, the court decides, as a conclusion of law, that the claimant recover judgment against the United States and the Printe Quidians I wenty- six hundred and ten dollars (\$ 7610, =). IT IS ORDERED that out of the said judgment the sum of Three Sundred and niverty-one dollars (\$ 391.00) be allowed and paid to Simon Lyon , claimant Sattorney of record, in full for all services in this case. The petition as to the depredations set forthing finding IV. is dismissed

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Theodore Timothy "Ted" Judge died in Cupertino, California, June 11, 2008. Although neither he nor his late wife Ellen Sheehy Judge left descendants, they shared a mutual interest in family history that they enthusiastically pursued over the years. In his will Ted left legacies to numerous charities and institutions, including the Bancroft Library at the University of California at Berkeley, where he had spent many hours as a student. His bequest required that the Bancroft Library, in conjunction with administrators of the Judge estate, arrange for the publication of a book of Judge and Sheehy genealogy to be distributed to Ted and Ellen's cousins. The California Genealogical Society, a non-profit society and library in Oakland, California, contracted to fulfill this request. This book is the result.

Ted's will stated his desire to provide a genealogy of, and stories about, both his and his wife Ellen's families back to the immigrant ancestors, believed at the time to include only a few generations. Since many lines were found to extend back into 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> century Pennsylvania and New England, the scope of this book has been limited to five generations.

Other branches included westward-bound settlers and more recent immigrants from Europe. Ted Judge's Harman family traveled west from Illinois with a wagon train that included the original Donner party. The Harmans were among the earliest settlers of San Francisco when it was still known as Yerba Buena and had a population of less than five hundred. John Sheehy, immigrant ancestor of Ellen Sheehy Judge, was a young ship's master from Ireland who abandoned the sea for various landlubber pursuits in California: gold mining, drayage, and a ship salvage business until he and his brother purchased land in Santa Cruz and Monterey counties.
